Three African Trade Knives

Here are three knives that I have acquired in to this the past two or three years. I traded for two of them type of (one from Bill Claussen, one from Larry Peetz), and then bought the third, the one with the fitted sheath, from Tony Mulder at the 2000 OKCA show.

All three are lightly made, with fullered blades. They have hollow sheet metal bolsters -nickel plated steel bolsters on the small knife, brass bolsters on the two larger ones. The horn handles on the smaller knife are "spotted" to resemble tortoiseshell. The handles of the two larger knives are smooth bone.

My smaller knife has a nickel-silver fleur-delis and bouquet pressed into the front handle. Blade marked ACIER FONDU -- French for Cast Steel.

One of the large knives is marked FERNANDO ESSER/ ELBERFELD. Esser was a cutlery firm in Elberfeld that manufactured mainly for export. Elberfeld was a city just north of Solingen, which became part of Wuppertal in 1929.

The other large knife is marked *T. ASSMANN* in italics. This style of italic stamping was the usual form of a retailer's mark on a German knife. Most likely this knife was made by Esser for Assmann.

From the evidence of the knives themselves, I concluded that they were made in the first quarter of the 20th century, two of them in Germany, one probably in France --though it might have been made in Germany for sale to French-speaking

The construction of all three knives is similar up.

"Prussian" butcher k n i f e (reproduced from a 1914 US hardware wholesale catalog). These lowcost knives had white m e t a l (pewter),

iron, or hollow sheet steel bolsters, though hollow sheet steel seems to have been most common.

What the knives did not tell me was what type of knives they are, and where they were intended to be sold. Their light weight and cheap construction suggested that they were meant to be sold or traded in some relatively primitive part of the planet, but in the 1910s and 1920s, that description fit a majority of the nations and dependencies around the world.

So I post my pictures on www.BladeForums.com, and sat back to see what would happen. Several people posted plausible guesses, including North Africa and South America, but with no solid evidence to back them

Then Steve Dick weighed in. First he mentioned a picture of a similar knife shown in a French book. It was one of 200,000 such knives supposedly issued to African troops drafted from French colonies to fight against the Germans


Then he directed me to a website in South Africa. It shows knives similar in style to my two larger knives, made today in Kwazulu, both for local use and for regional trade. The company that makes them is a formerly German firm, which transplanted from Solingen in 1987.

In Solingen the original firm was called Ferdinand Everts & Sohn. It was founded in 1880. though the Okapi mark only dates back to 1902. The Okapi logo includes a picture of an okapi, a forest-dwelling African herbivore related to

giraffes, but which looks to have been assembled from leftover parts of half a dozen more familiar creatures, including zebra and wildebeest. Another Everts trademark was Schneidteufel, German for "Cut-Devil." Everts,

A tale of two Vince's??

Recently I found some contract information on a World War Two contractor that manufactured the "Hard Hat Diver's Knives" and machetes. Seen in M.H Cole's book III, the Vince Diving knife is a hard to come by piece. In Cole IV he has a Vince Forge 18" M1942 machete shown, I am still looking for one of those babies. Well, the paperwork I found related to machetes made by Vince; but this was Vince Fencing Equipment Co., Inc. of New York, NY. Well, Vince Forge is in Easton, PA, which is a very short distance from the Big Apple; but all the Vince Fencing Equipment Co. sales listed were for "Foreign Missions", not to the US, and among those sales were machetes. The Vince Forge machetes are not marked US on the blade nor are they dated like all the other WW II made machetes. The one shown in Cole's book IV has the original paper sticker on the blade which is written in Spanish, this really made me believe it was simply a commercial item in a military scabbard; but I am not so sure anymore. Well, anyway, that is my theory for now. Vince Fencing Equipment Co. Inc made fencing equipment and machetes for the US government to be sold strictly to foreign aid missions, that part is fact. The machete contract I found was for \$56,000.00 alone, so at the WW II price of about \$0.50 to \$0.80 for a machete that would leave a lot of machetes to be found, where are they now?? I just wonder if it was the same Vince, or was it actually a different company? Many companies had stores in New York City, it would have been a natural. But the company having a different name, now that makes me wonder. If you have any information on this, I would love to hear it.





Randall Blade Markings

The controversy over the Fl. Vs. Fla. marked blade is over. According to recent findings by Rhett Stidham the FLA. stamp is being used today on stainless steel Randall Made blades and has been used intermittently ever since the 1984 introduction of the FL. stamp. On smaller Randall Made knives the FL. Stamp is the normal stamp used since 1984. On the larger stainless bladed models, the ones we are most

This year we have made special arrangements with the Courtyard by Marriott. They given the Oregon Knife Collectors a special break on rooms. The Courtyard is located right off the freeway and is easy access to the Show. Marriott also has what they call the Residence Inn which is geared to those that are staying more than the weekend. Their rooms have kitchen facilities. This facility has also agreed to extend special rates to the OKCA show goers

Last year the Hawthorne Inn was user friendly to our group. Apparently they have had a managerial change, and I detect that the attitude toward our group is negative. As such I would suggest not considering this facility.

Membership is due...

For 2002 by the end of December. Membership for the OKCA is based on a calendar year. That calendar starts January 01 and ends December 32. We have made it real easy to tell the status of your dues. If you are paid up for 2002 then your mailing label on this Knewslettter will state 2002. If the number is 2003, 2004, 2005 then that tells us you are a strong supporter in the OKCA and have paid years in advance. We like you. If your mailing label has 2001 on it, you might want to address this now. Besides that, it is tough to handle the rush at the last moment.

By the way please fill out the application form as that is the way we save your records. If you don't fill out a form, I have to and then you have the curse of dennis on you. (That curse has something to do with instant rust on your knives.) Also on the table requests, if you don't sign it, then I mail it back. So read it and sign it please.

Tips and Tricks about the Show.

We have a waiting list of about 30 tables for the 2002 Show. The cut off date for "right of first refusal" for those that had tables at the 2001 Show is December 15th. Those tables not claimed (means paid for and 2002 membership paid) will then be assigned to those on the waiting list. Therefore if you are wanting to get a table at our Show for the first time, then you had better respond quickly. I predict a sold out Show of 470 tables for 2002.

When your money is sent in for a reservation, we do not acknowledge that we received it. Instead we ask that you review your checks and see if we have cashed your check. That is your confirmation that the money was received. We will mail table confirmations and 2002 membership cards the last week in December.

A statement about the tables at the Oregon Show is that you had better like your neighbor. The reason is that the same table is available to the same person year after year. Every once in a while someone makes a request to move or asks for a second table. This is a very difficult thing to do. Most times impossible. The reason is that very rarely do we have people dropping out. So you can ask, but the odds are tough.

The goal of the Oregon Show is to provide an environment for education, enjoyment, an emotional happening, fun and camaraderie. It is not

for the purpose of setting up a selling and buying theater. That may happen, but not by our design. So if you gauge the Show based on how much you sell or buy, then you are on your own. The buying

> and selling might happen for the reasons we promote but having this work for you is your responsibility.

Do not forget that table holders that leave early either Saturday or Sunday or cover their tables during the Show are in violation of our Show rules. We have enforced this and there are several people that will never be able to attend our show as tableholders again. This same policy now exists for the mini show. Agree to our hours in word and deed.

Life Goes On African Knives Continued from Page I

Phyllis and I were on our way to The Blade Show West on the morning of September 20, and the new regulations on what can be carried onto an airplane were in effect. My customized Swiss Army knife is not just a knife but a tool kit that has gotten me out of many troubles over the years. How would I be able to fix anything without the screwdriver blades, punch, scissors, nail file and, yes the two cutting blades? No Pocket Knives! The signs were up at most of the airport security check points, and there would be no exceptions. What's the World coming to!

A pocket knife has been my constant companion from the time I was about five years old. There haven't been half a dozen days in my life that I left home without one and usually I had either forgot it or lost it. Every time I discovered that empty pocket I got an awful feeling that somehow I wasn't complete. Sort of like being naked in the middle of Times Square, New York City. United Airlines got us to Santa Anna -John Wavne -Costa Mesa -Orange County Airport. Yes, that airport is known by all of those names. The show was at the Hyatt Regency in Irvine, a new location and a good one. The hotel is in the middle of a business park surrounded by tall office buildings. One of our new customers worked in one of those buildings. He saw an advertisement in the newspaper and came to see what it was all about. Shows are a great time of learning and sharing, and this one was no exception. Many old friends were there, and we made some new ones as well as getting new customers. I had 17 knives, the most at any show in recent years. Only eight came home with us. We sold lots of Goddard Clipits and quite a number of my two books.

The high point of the show for me was finding a Nikon stereo microscope on the table of Bill Herndon. I picked it up and never put it down until I determined that it would work for engraving. I toiled late into the night to modify my engraving bench to get the right working height for the microscope. It was like the night before Christmas as I awaited the moment when I could cut some lines under the new scope. As soon I went to work under the microscope I realized that I had overcome the last obstacle in my long odyssey of learning to engrave. I could actually see what I was doing. It's a variable power that goes from 10X to 40X. With the power set on 20X, I cut two straight lines and then crossed them with little lines, sort of a little railroad track pattern. I took the practice piece out of the ball, put my glasses on and could just make out the little pattern. Now I understand how the professional engravers do such fine detail work. Now I need to get more practice time in.

BLADE Show West was a great show for every maker I talked to. The success came because the knifemakers all showed up, and the customers from the Los Angeles area came out in droves. We can't go back and change the events of September 11, 2001; we must go on with our lives. The terrorists will have a small victory over us if we hide in a corner and cry.



If in doubt, check with the Show Chairman ahead of time. The OKCA reserves the right to bar any item from display or sale. No firearms made after 1898 may be sold or shown at this show.

ALL EXHIBITORS are required to keep their tables set up throughout the public hours of the Show: 9 AM Saturday to 3 PM Sunday. ANY EXHIBITOR WHO LEAVES BEFORE 3 PM SUNDAY FORFEITS HIS FUTURE RESERVATIONS AND WILL BE DENIED TABLES AT FUTURE OREGON KNIFE SHOWS.

DISPLAY TABLES will be around the perimeter of the room. All displays are eligible for display awards, which are handmade knives donated by members and supporters of OKCA. Display judging will be by rules established by OKCA. Special category awards may also be offered. *NOTHING MAY BE SOLD FROM DISPLAY TABLES*.

SALE/TRADE TABLES Sharing of tables will not be allowed. Exhibitors must comply with all applicable local, state, and federal laws. Oregon has NO SALES TAX.

However, it is *ILLEGAL* to carry a switchblade knife, a gravity knife, a dagger, or a dirk concealed on one's person, or for a convicted felon to possess a switchblade or gravity knife. Most other states have banned switchblade knives. Under federal law, it is *ILLEGAL* to mail, carry, or ship a switchblade or gravity knife across state lines.



Sheffield Cutlers' Trade Marks

by Jim Taylor

It was an Act of Parliament that incorporated the Cutlers' Company of Sheffield in 1624. Before that date cutlers' marks were granted by a Court officiated by the Lords of the Manor of Sheffield. It is recorded that in 1564 a mark was granted to Robert Boure. His mark "O H" entitled him to the sole use of this device for the princely sum of one penny per year.

The paragraph above is paraphrased from the first chapter of introduction that can be found, in what I believe, was Sheffield's first published, REGISTER OF TRADE MARKS OF THE CUTLER'S COMPANY OF SHEFFIELD by J. H. Whitham and D. Vickers in 1919. The only other such tome was published in 1953, by J.H. Whitham (son? same person?) and A. Sykes.

I believe that these Registers were only available to the subscribers, members, advertisers and British Consuls throughout the world. Accordingly, they were not sold to the general public and HENCE, their extreme rarity today. The 1919 edition is virtually unobtainable.

Some of the thousands of trade marks are quite entertaining, and I include a number for your enlightenment and amusement. The listing is taken from the 1919 edition:

B4ANY (Before Any) I.C. (Spectacles device) I.D.F.Y. (I Defy) IXL (I Excell)

O.K. (Okay) X.C.D. (Exceed) XL. ALL (Excel All)

William Jessop & Sons Ltd. Jonas & Culver Ltd. Aaron Hildick George Wostenholm & Sons Burgon & Ball Ltd. W. & S. Butcher Ltd. Needham, Veall & Tyzack Ltd.



The choice of trade marks was of the UTMOST IMPORTANCE. Very few of the cutlers were literate and the device marked on their products had to be recognizable world wide. I find it quite remarkable how often very similar, if not exactly alike, many of the trade marks are. > Do I have a favorite, you ask? YES, of course I do. It is the mark of Herbert Robinson & Co. Canton Works, Sheffield. Their trade mark was depicted as a GRINDER sitting behind his huge grindstone with sparks flying in every direction. If ever a logo/trademark said it all, this one did! Robinson's "GRINDER" trade mark is, or perhaps I should say, was, the most recognizable device in all of Sheffield.

Bernard Levine was over to the house a few days ago looking for some specimens of knives for an article he is planning. In the process I pulled out a knife that I had not thought about in years. As we talked about this knife, memories poured out concerning the extensive research that I had done to find its history. Bernard encouraged me to write a few words about the knife; so in order to accomplish this, I thought that I should go back and find the notes I had made. I put them in a safe place. And they are still safe. I did find some other treasures of literature, but those will be saved for another day.

I do recall that I purchased this knife about 20 years ago or maybe more. It was an obvious advertising knife; and because it said Eugene, Oregon, on it, I know that I must have paid an outrageous price for it at the time. Maybe twenty dollars.

Let me describe this knife to go along with the pictures. The handles are metal (probably nickel silver), and the words are either stamped in or are raised letters. The face side says:

THE HOLDER OF THIS KNIFE WILL BE ALLOWED ONE DOLLAR ON ANY MAN'S SUIT OR OVERCOAT. SIMPLY SHOW THE KNIFE.

The back side of the knife says:

ROBERTS BROS TOGGERY MEANS WEAR EUGENE ORE.

The knife is marked - A.W. WILLIAMS & CO.- NEW YORK on the front tang and H. KESCHNER GERMANY ON THE BACK TANG of this two blade knife. The knife is about as mint as one you would buy today as new.

When I first received this knife I was puzzled over the word "Toggery." A trip to my Funk & Wagnall didn't help as this word was not even listed. Several dictionaries later I found the word, and a guess that the word came into use in 1811. It also suggested that it came from "togs" and was used in reference to clothing. In any event it was one of those words that comes into fashion for a

Cut-toon)ronk knives 19000 BC period of time and then goes out. It gave me the clue that Roberts Bros was a clothing store. Pretty smart hey, considering that the discount with the knife was for a man's suit or overcoat. Momma didn't raise no dummy.

I like to second guess knives before they reveal their real story so I figured that a German made knife would be out of favor from about 1914 to 1924 (WWI) and from 1935 until 1950 (WWII). I also guessed that it was after 1950 from the looks of it, but


boy was I wrong on that one. A look in Goins and Levine suggested that this was a 1920s knife. And that was a firm maybe. So the search went on. Having an insatiable appetite for historical mysteries, dear elayne and I went to the University of Oregon and did a search on old newspapers. Those newspapers prior to 1930 required the use of

a microfilm reader. I know that we spent numerous evenings going back in time looking for any clue to Robert's Toggery. We had also searched city directories for a clue to this store. Nothing.

We started looking in the 1920s and nothing showed up. It is a fact that one can become quite nauseous looking at microfilm go flying before

your face in the hunt for information. I had to actually slow down before I conquered the quezzy stomach syndrome. I remember it well. So then we started in 1919 to 1918 and down through the years. It was slow tedious work. We were looking mainly for advertisements for this store for if they purchased an advertising knife chances are they purchased advertising space in the local newspaper.
