Mess Kit Knives of WWI

After finding and obtaining all of the common US military knives, you may find that, to expand your collection, you must spend more than your budget allows. One solution I've found is trying to obtain different US Government-issued mess kit knives. They are fairly common and often quite inexpensive, but I have seen very little information about them other than the single page devoted to the subject in *Levine's Guide to Knives and their Values, 4th edition.* The official designation of the WWI mess kit knife with a 3 5/8 inch long blade is "Model of 1910".

I recently found a WWI mess kit knife marked HMCo 1918. I had not seen the marking before, and I consulted Frank Trzaska about it. Frank identified the maker as the Hinckley Manufacturing Company and gave me the source of his information, *America's Munitions* 1917-1918 by Benedict Crowell, printed by the Government Printing Office, 1919. A short search on the Internet yielded a copy, which I purchased at a favorable price.

Crowell lists five suppliers as making mess kit knives for US forces in WWI. The five manufacturers are American Cutlery Company of Chicago (A.C.C.), Landers Frary & Clark (L.F.&C.), Hinckley Manufacturing Company (HMCo), International Silverware Co. (ISC), and Rock Island Arsenal (R.I.A.). The manufacturers and numbers of knives delivered are listed in Table I below. I checked my accumulation of mess kit knives and found that I had examples of all but R.I.A. (see photo #1).

A couple of e-mails to Frank Trzaska and Dennis Ellingsen netted photos of an R.I.A. knife dated knife and an A.C.C. knife dated 1918.

Taking a look at what knives the three of us had, revealed that all the L.F.&C. knives are dated 1917, the A.C.C. knives are dated 1917 and 1918, and the ISC knives are dated 1918. Additionally, A.C.C. 1917 knives show three handle castings (see photo #2). One of the A.C.C. knives and the R.I.A. knife were produced using the same handle castings that were used on earlier 5 1/2-inch long mess kit knives (Model of 1903) (see photo #3). The official change from the Model of 1903 to the Model of 1910 was 1910.

It is also reasonable to believe that A.C.C., located in Chicago, IL, would have fairly easy access to the handle casting molds from R.I.A., which is located about 130 miles west of Chicago. LF&C was located in New Britain, CT, and ISC was located in Meridan, CT. The location of HMCO is presently unknown.



The evidence so far shows that the earlier handle casting molds, which required a separate manufacturing step to stamp in the U.S. and manufacturer's initials and date, were superseded by a new style that had the same information as part of the casting mold. If A.C.C. was the first non-governmental contractor to build the mess kit knives, it follows that A.C.C. would be the place where improvements to the manufacturing process would be tried out.







Sheffield Cutlery Ephemera (Part Three) Jim Taylor

Back in 1999 word had filtered through to me that the old and illustrious company, Elliott's (Cutlers) Ltd., Sylvester Street, Sheffield, were in the process of bankruptcy. Founded in 1795,

the respected name of Joseph Elliott became one of Sheffield premier manufacturers, especially of table cutlery of every conceivable shape and domestic use, as well as an enormous range of trade knives.

Originally based in Hollis Croft, Sheffield, Elliott's soon began to acquire the trademarks of less fortunate companies, until eventually they owned the business of: Allen & Sons: Thomas Ellin: James Barber: John Wigfall: John Wilson and Lockwood Brothers, to name just a few.

Moving to Sylvester Street around 1920, the company became involved with another group

of related firms that bore the ponderous title of "Sheffield Cutlery Manufacturers Limited." This amalgamation proved to be of little commercial value and duly fizzled out in the 1930s. Elliott's, though, did survive this debacle and even prospered.

Please realize that in the cutlery industry of Sheffield, the actual buildings were, in the main, storehouses for parts and finished products. All of the actual work was done by Little Mesters on a piece work basis. Therefore, the true value of these companies was vested in the trademarks and the associated good will, and nothing else.

Knowing all about this company's 200 year old history was a distinct advantage to me. I just KNEW that good old "stuff" must be inside there, somewhere! It's an old but very true saying: "It's not what you know in life, it's WHO you know that counts!" So it came to pass that in December, 2000, Cindy and I were invited to look around what was left of the Sylvester Street Works. Suffice to say, we jumped at the opportunity.


Sadly, very, very little remained! Much of the building, or perhaps I should say buildings, has already been converted into apartments for Sheffield University students and were well and truly occupied. We saw miserable piles of broken machinery and a few boxes of rusted blades, etc.; and I figured that we were months too late. It was then that I noticed the tea chests in a corner! Underneath a heap of junk cardboard I unearthed a couple of cartons of cutlery box labels!



C. 1900. Small but informative label in gilt with yellow background. (Authors Inventory)


Now, since my earliest days in Sheffield, I have been enamored of cutlery box labels, and for several reasons: 1) They are extremely colorful: 2) Very informative: 3) Easily framed for display: 4) Mostly very old and 5) Not expensive.

Amongst this junk and rubbish I "rescued" a selection of about 15 different labels relating to several of the above mentioned companies, along with a small supply of duplicates of each one. A price was quickly negotiated and everyone was happy. Me? I was almost delirious! Why? Because in all of my

years in Sheffield and despite being on very friendly terms with Arthur Bennet, the company director in charge of Elliott's—Arthur retired about 1990, when well over 80 years of age—and yet I had never seen or heard of a single one of these labels.

Incidentally folks, common knowledge in Sheffield dictates that if a box label doesn't mention "stainless steel" then you safely "bet your boots" that the said label is pre WWI. The Lockwood Brothers labels with the ostrich logo and marked: "TABLE CUTLERY" are, in my opinion, the "ROLLS-ROYCE" of all cutlery labels. They are heavily embossed in gilt and come in six background colors. Trust me here, this comes from a man that, if nothing else, know his cutlery box labels!



C.1900. Colorful in the extreme with blue, white and red. (Authors Inventory)




C.1900. Elaborate : Gilt: black and green label. (Authors Inventory)

Ron Edwards Knife Display at the 2002 Show

Last weekend I attended a real nice knife show in Salem, Oregon. While there I was talking with Dennis Ellingsen about our Northwest Knife Collectors Show, February 23-24 at the Puyallup, Washington Fairgrounds. Dennis asked if I would like to display my "Coke bottle" style knife collection at the 2002 April Show. After being assured I would get a real nice location, and not in the broom closet he first offered, I said it would be a pleasure to show my knives.

In the many years I have been attending the Oregon Show, one of the top things on my list is to look at the collector displays, perhaps now I can pay back to others what they have given me.



Is it Sharp?

In testing the sharpness of a knife blade we have the traditional arm shaving, paper cutting, rope cutting and thumb nail scraping. A new method has been discovered that will prove interesting.

How about an unscientific test that is a whole lot of fun? Hold your knife in one hand with the edge facing you. Place a morning-newspaper-sized rubber band over the blade and pull it away from the edge about 18". Release the rubber band (NOT THE KNIFE!). The rubber band will bounce off of a dull edge and just hang on the blade. A sharp blade will cut the rubber band. A blade that is super sharp will cut the rubber band into multiple pieces. How it does this is a mystery.

After this story I am going out and investing in a rubber band company.
