

It's Show Time 2007 By Wayne Goddard

It's been interesting to see the way the OKCA Show has grown over the years. It is truly unique among shows and owes its success to the fact that we have stayed with the fundamental principles we started with. The show has the best collections displayed at any show in the country. Demonstrations are almost non stop, and there are always all those tables full of new and exciting knife stuff. There is virtually something for everyone interested in knives and related things. For those who attend shows all across the country, the OKCA Show has a reputation of being the most fun to attend.

I look forward to the annual OKCA Show most of the year. I don't mind saying that my world revolves around it. Part of it is because I'm never totally prepared for it with new knives. After each show I always plan on having a better inventory at the next show. Show time comes around much too fast, and once again I've not got my "dream" inventory ready. We set up and keep more than busy during the show. I hurry through the show,

heading for my next assignment or duty. I see makers who I've previously met at shows, even old friends; and there isn't time to stop and say hello. I find many knifemakers I have not met, and there isn't time to stop and get acquainted and take a look at their work. There were all those tables of interesting knives, materials and the occasional interesting tool. I did make time for some of those and got some interesting handle materials and a tool or two.

Much too soon the famous countdown started at ten-seconds to three on Sunday. It is over much too fast to suit me and usually finds me wanting to yell. "No!please give me just one more day." Things have been a little better when the last two shows ended because I adjusted my attitude just before the show in 2006. At that time I made up my mind that I wasn't going to get to see it all and that I would be satisfied with whatever I was able to see in the time allotted. It's been a lot less traumatic for me with my adjusted attitude, and I have enjoyed the show more because of it.

Just for a minute or so let us pretend that you have become interested in collecting knives and decide to attend your first knife show. All those you have talked to say the best show in the country is the Oregon Knife Show. I like to crunch numbers so I'll give you a time guide in order that you make the most of your time. You arrive at the show on Saturday and walk through the entrance door at 9am and stay till the show closes at 6pm. You tried to see as much as possible in the allotted time, but there was a whole area of the show that was missed. Sunday morning you're up bright and early and once again walk through the entrance at 9am and stay till the show is over at 3pm. All of a sudden folks are packing up, and



you still haven't seen it all. There simply wasn't enough time. In order for you to grasp the serious nature of the situation, I will help you with the numbers. There were 470 tables of knives and related stuff. Saturday and Sunday there were a total of fifteen hours available, or put another way 900 minutes. That allows the attendee two-minutes (actually 1.91 minutes) per table. Let's boost the time by becoming a member of OKCA which allows admittance on Friday, the set up day. Not all the tables will be filled, but the extra hours will give you a head start on seeing it all. Set up day starts at 10am and closes at 8pm. That will give the attendee ten additional hours, or 600 more minutes added to the 900 minutes available on Saturday and Sunday. We now have a grand total of 1,500 minutes available. Divide the 1,500 minutes by 470 tables and that gives the attendee slightly over three minutes per table. Not enough time, you say? I see only one cure for this, and it's the attitude adjustment that it can't all be seen in the time available.

I've seen enough of the world to be satisfied with where I live. I've seen Paris, Atlanta, Dallas, New York City, Los Angeles, Pearl Harbor, the White Cliffs of Dover (from the air on the way to Paris). I've lived in Gooding, Idaho and spent time in Lincoln, Montana. That's enough for me to be content with the planet we live on. I'll just apply that to the Oregon Knife Show. Think of the Oregon Knife Show as a planet of knife stuff, ready for the explorer. I can hardly wait till show time 2008.

I'd like to hear from anyone who has a system for seeing it all.

On Thursday nite we had the Second Annual Social, a before-the-show happening thanks to the financial donations of the following:

These donations help us offset the cost for this event. Thank you, Valley River Inn staff, for the extra efforts on our behalf.

Also I want to thank the Valley River Inn for the bouquet that was sent to the Lane Events Center for our Show. It was a pleasant addition to the Club table.

Sue Myers volunteered to hand out the table-holder's packets to the line of people eager to enter the Show arena. **Tim Cooper and the Show Facilitators** did an excellent job of crowd controlling our band of visitors.

There was a busy time at the Club table. **Glenda Brown** was the force behind the table who kept everything on course. She also coordinated the Silent Auction event. **Eric Weidenhaft** kept the information on the Big Signs up to date with the winners of the door prizes and the demonstration schedules.

We were paid for 72 tables for the 2008 Show and received 70 single memberships and 68 family memberships. The Silent Auction raised \$3,930. The Club Knife prototypes brought an additional \$1,050. Thank you, **Ford Swauger**, and all of you who participated, for your contribution to our fund raiser.

Bowen Cannoy, Noah Cannoy, Betty Johnson, Sheila Sinks and Alicia Weaver sold raffle tickets and "manned" the door prize booth. We had 195 donations. We realized \$2,959 with the raffle. We did a

much better job of disposing of the door prizes and raffles, only had to mail 86 this year. (It was 127 last year.) The Big Signs helped.

We sold a two day pass this year for \$7.00 (regular admission is \$5.00 each day)

hoping to get return traffic on Sunday. We sold 27 passes. We also tried something new this year and discontinued the free passes to the tableholders. The Board did not believe the passes were generating "new" faces so this year we arranged reduced-cost entry for members who wanted a guest to come. The admission figures were about 4000, which is many people in one place at the same time.

We did have a few snags this year- the LIBRARY SALE - the PETITIONERS - the children (anyone under the age of 12 is to be accompanied by an adult, not running around the Show) - and the dogs (under the table, behind the table, on a leash going outside or back to the table--not walking the Show) - and the people who wanted to get their friends or clients in free by requesting a table-holder badge. We provide two badges per table-holder because there is limited room behind the table. We restrict Friday to a day of table-holders and members only, a perk of membership. Our membership cost is very minimal - \$20.00 - and supports our excellent "Knewslettter." If they do not want to pay the \$20.00 fee, they can wait until Saturday and pay \$5.00 and get a door prize card.

Dennis and I delivered a letter to the 26 people who will be affected by the elimination of two rows of tables (36 tables) for the 2008 Show. We assure you, you are wanted and needed. We will do our best to accommodate you for the 2008 Show. We will have the same room (the Exhibit Hall), but we will have fewer tables. It is necessary

to have a waiting list when we get the inevitable cancellations just before the Show. We do not and will not allow empty tables during the Show hours which means until 3:00pm on Sunday.

We especially want to thank all the people-tableholders, displayers, display award knife enhancers, grinders, donators, "Knewslettter" writers, officers, members and visitors--who helped to make the Show a fun happening for all who attended. Please give yourself a pat on the back for a job well done. Please note the articles in this "Knewslettter" which include the names of the contributors, displayers, demonstrators, winners of the handmade knife competition and the grinding competition. All of us are a very necessary part to add together to get the whole which is the OKCA Annual Show.



OKCA Knews and Musings *ibdennis*

Summer Hiatus R Us.....

There will be no "Knewslettters" for the month of June, July and August. The OKCA Board takes a rest during that time to rejuvenate from all the efforts extended for the last nine months. No meetings, no "Knewslettters"... just lying around in the sun and relaxing. However when August rolls around (we start the "Knewslettter" in late August for the new season), we will need to have some contributions from the membership of articles so we will be able to continue in the spirit of our previous publications. Send those articles in any time please.

The Changes for the 2008 Show

It seems that our reduction of tables for the 2008 Show has been met with confusion. No, we are not moving to another location..... No, we do not have reduced enthusiasm for the Show. So now this is the final word on the reduction.

In 2001 we expanded the number of tables from 435 tables to 470 tables. At 435 tables we generated a waiting list but had complaints that not everyone could get a table at the Show. We increased the number of tables, eliminated the waiting list but were presented with the problem to keep those tables filled with the inevitable cancellations due to illness or personal commitment conflicts. It was only about a dozen tables, but we have a goal to fill our Show to capacity.

In 2004 we realized the peak had been reached. In 2005 we intended to cut back, but the Antique Bowie Association expressed an interest to attend; and it was suggested we might not have enough tables to support their attendance at the Show in 2006. We added an additional 50 tables and rented the Atrium Room to house them, for a new total of 520, anticipating a surge of tableholders. It didn't happen. For 2007 we considered reducing the number back to 435, but thought we would get a carry over from 2006 or a new surge of activity. Not the case.

So for 2007, three weeks before the Show, we boasted one morning that we had three tables to fill and would you believe that by afternoon we had five tables to fill. Creativity to fill tables only goes so far. And then again by Show time, we had a dozen tables to fill.

During the 2007 Show we walked around and told those people who would be affected that we were going to eliminate the two rows on the South side of the building. These persons will get top priority in their relocation. All other table locations will remain the same providing table reservations are received in a timely manner. (Remember to watch you "Knewslettter" label. You must be a 2008 member to have a table at the 2008 Show.) It also means that when the deadline for renewing tables happens on December 15, 2007, we will not remind people they forgot to re-up for 2008. We will again have a waiting list. We will not have to be creative when we receive

the anticipated cancellations just prior to the Show. And depending on how it goes, we might consider shared tables once again. I said might.....(dear elayne sezs that the might is very, very, iffy)

Crowds at the 2007 Show....

My tradition is to stand atop an eight foot ladder at 10:30 on Saturday morning and shoot a picture of the crowd. Usually by 2:00 pm there is a slight thinning of visitors. Not this year. It seems that by 5:00 pm the thinning was seen. I was amazed.

Our only absolute frustration was the "Friends of the Library" sale. Last year the weather was nice so the lines curled around the outside of the building. This year the weather was not so accommodating so the lines for the book sale were allowed to curl around the inside of the building. And curl they did--in front of our room and in front of the concession stand that was opened early to serve these early risers. No one bought anything at the concession stand as you couldn't get close to it.

We complained bitterly to the Library group as to the impact of the lines and obstruction of the entrance to the Knife Show however nothing was done to alleviate the problem. Finally a make shift solution was enacted; and as the day wore on it was relieved somewhat. But it was frustrating.

Back in 1992....

The Saturday Nite Social in 1992 was an interesting one. We had it as a reserve in our library and recently when we went to find it, it was gone. Now gone is put in a safe place or gone is loaned out and not returned. Our thanks also go to the others in the orange vests who help move people around the building. And what would we do without **Bowen Cannoy.** A mainstay for sure when it comes to running the raffle and the door prizes. Our receptionists were exceptionally responsive to the throngs of people that visited our Show. They were **Sandy Hicks** and **Erin Bucklew**.

I also want to thank the OKCA Board for their tremendous support and help in making the Oregon Knife Collectors Association one of the "Best."

I started working on the fatter of the two blades the following Friday after the Show. On Saturday I should have that knife done, so I'll go ahead and send a picture of it completed.


