#### The Robeson Whittler by ibdennis

For many years I ran ads in this publication for a Robeson whittler pocketknife. In truth I had been looking for a knife like this for the past 25 plus years. I had never seen one offered for sale; but those that were offered were close, but not winners. So how does one become obsessed with finding a particular knife and why?

The story revolves around my good friend, Loy Moss. Loy and I are charter members of the Oregon Knife Collectors Association. Loy has

been a good friend as well as a fellow knife collector. I have some real treasure knives that came from Loy. I have had some wonderful moments with Loy that go back to many hours spent in a power plant in a lumber mill when he was working, and then there were other times spent on his farm. Good times.

About 25 years ago Loy handed me a knife and asked me what I thought of it. I told him I liked it and liked it enough to buy it, whatever the price. This Robeson large, equal end whittler pattern felt good in the hand and had a



character that appealed to me. Loy felt the same way about it. In fact it wasn't a put in a display box knife but, rather, a carry in your pocket and use type knife. The shield bore the name "Pocket Eze." The shield name brought attention to the fact that this was a sunk joint knife that had no sharp corners that could tear holes in your pocket when you carried the knife. It had beautiful honey bone handles and was a 1930s vintage knife.

As we both liked it we struck on this idea that we could share the knife. I think I held out \$30 and suggested that I would carry it for awhile; and then when Loy wanted it back, we would again trade dollars for the knife. I think we both thought that we would find another one, and then both of us could have this special pattern knife. For several years we traded dollars and that knife, and both of us were happy with the experience. We would meet on the streets and ask the other whether he was carrying it and bring it out for inspection.

And then one day Loy approached me with a somber expression on his face. He had lost the knife. It wasn't one of those misplaced and soon to be found lost; this was a lost it forever type lost. My heart sunk. Loy was on the farm when it happened. He was working with a string tag baler and using the knife to cut the string. And then it was gone. A search around the field did not find it. In fact Loy spent hours looking for that lovely Robeson. He even said he would spend future years looking for it in hopes of finding it, but it never happened.

That was 25 or so years ago. I vowed I would find another for no other reason than in honor of our friendship. I looked and looked. I even had a Robeson collector keep his eyes open for one, figuring that he would spot one with no problem. Nothing! I haunted knife shows looking and hoping. Nothing!

And then one day I spotted a picture of one in a book. It was a pattern 633499 and had a spear blade. I couldn't recall whether the knife had a spear main blade, but this one was close enough. Now I had a number and a picture. But in reality it didn't get me any closer to the knife I was

wanting. This went on for years.

And then eBay happened. I had searches going on constantly for this knife. Nothing! Even automatic searches revealed nothing. And then one day Charlie Campagna wrote me an email asking if I had seen this



Robeson whittler up for auction. My eBay search engine failed to find it so I looked where Charlie pointed. And there it was. Exactly what I was looking for. It was a pattern number 632498. And then it dawned on me that it was a clip point main blade that we had, and that this was the same knife. It wasn't the lost knife, but was one just like it.

I told dear elayne that I was going to have that knife no matter what I had to bid for it. I told her what my maximum bid would be. She gulped and rolled her eyes in a manner only she can do and said faintly, "go for it." I think she thought it would go for far less than that and I did too. All during the bidding process, it looked like I would get it for a high but nominal figure. Even up until the last minute I gulped but had calculated the number it would stop at. It was fine. I should have known by the name of the bidder that put it into orbit that he might be nuttier than I. He came within \$20 of my ludicrous, outrageous, stupid, spendthrift, exorbitant and costly bid. But I won it. And dear elayne's exclamation when I told her will forever ring in my ears. And keeps on ringing and ringing and ringing.

I shared my victory with Loy, and he was happy for me. We both agreed on the facts of the story. Loy asked what I had paid for it, and I sheepishly told him. He helped by consoling me about it. I asked if he would be interested in carrying it in his pocket like we did all those years ago. He declined. Loy was always smarter than I when it came to spending only reasonable amounts of money. It is mine now. I will carry and enjoy this knife, and it will bring back fond memories of our special friendship. In 2005 the *Knewslettter* began ending each article with a small picture of this knife symbolizing the conclusion of an article. Knives can be about friendships and memories. This knife will remind me about my good friend, Loy Moss, who left us on August 5, 2008.

#### The Kukri Notch by Ted Fitzwater

Anyone who has picked up and handled or just viewed a kukri wonders what is that notch for? Good question.

When the kukri was first seen by Westerners, they noted the shape; and some thought it could be thrown like a boomerang, using the notch as a sight. To me this is one of the more unusual ideas intended for the notch. Another idea for

the use of the notch was to keep blood off your hand after the user whacked on his opponent; any blood on the blade would flow down to the notch and drip off, not allowing it to get to the hand.

Still another use is set forth by Christopher Chant in his book *Gurkha*. On page ten there is a picture of a World War I kukri. In his description he states: "The notch above the hilt allows a Gurkha to catch his opponent's blade and, with a twist, disarm him before the killing stroke is delivered." Well, it sounds interesting enough, but the most sound purpose I have come across was found on line in a posting of the International Kukri Research and Historical Society which states the notch is a religious, or good luck, symbol.

In the posting the notch is called a Cho among other names, such as Kaudi and Kaura. Well, what kind of symbol is it? In India and Nepal the primary faith is Hindu; and the cow is sacred in both countries, making the cow's hoof combined with a temple roof (most often Hindu, but can be Buddhist or Muslim) the most common notch design. (Diagram 1)

In my kukri collection 99.5% are cow hoofs with various temple roofs. But please note there are many that have not been identified, and there are other religious symbols not shown in this paper.

I have drawn diagrams below of some of the Chos that have been identified. (Diagrams 2 thru 6)





Diagram 2. Cow's hoof/Shivas Temple

Diagram 3. Lord Buddhist Symbol




Diagram 4. Sitas temple




Diagram 5. Peacock head. Note the peacock is sacred to both Hindus and Buddhist and is the national symbol of Nepal.



If in doubt, check with the Show Chairman ahead of time. The OKCA reserves the right to bar any item from display or sale. No firearms made after 1898 may be sold or shown at this show.

ALL EXHIBITORS are required to keep their tables set up throughout the public hours of the Show: 8 AM Saturday to 3 PM Sunday. ANY EXHIBITOR WHO LEAVES OR COVERS THEIR TABLE BEFORE 3 PM SUNDAY FORFEITS HIS FUTURE RESERVATIONS AND WILL BE DENIED TABLES AT FUTURE OREGON KNIFE SHOWS.

**DISPLAY TABLES** will be around the perimeter of the room. All displays are eligible for display awards, which are handmade knives donated by members and supporters of OKCA. Display judging will be by rules established by OKCA. Special category awards may also be offered. *NOTHING MAY BE SOLD FROM DISPLAY TABLES*.

**SALE/TRADE TABLES** Sharing of tables will not be allowed. Exhibitors must comply with all applicable local, state, and federal laws. Oregon has NO SALES TAX.

**BADGES:** Each table holder is entitled to one additional show badge. **NO EXCEPTIONS.** 

**KNIFEMAKERS** who are present and are table holders at this show may enter knives in the knifemaking award competition.

**FOR MORE INFORMATION** on categories and judging criteria in the display and handmade knife competitions, contact the Show Chairman.

**SHOW FACILITATORS** will be provided by OKCA from 10AM Friday until 4 PM Sunday. However, exhibitors are responsible for watching their own tables. Neither the OKCA nor the Lane Events Center will be responsible for any loss, theft, damage, or injury of any kind.

**CITY AND COUNTY REGULATIONS** require that there be:

- No Smoking within the Exhibit Hall at any time:
- No alcoholic beverages consumed within the Exhibit Hall during the public hours of the show;
- No loaded firearms worn or displayed at the show;
- No swords or knives brandished or displayed in a provocative manner.

Violators of these safety rules will be asked to leave.

NOTE ON SWITCHBLADES AND DAGGERS: In Oregon it is legal to make, sell, buy, or own switchblade knives. However, it is ILLEGAL to carry a switchblade knife, a gravity knife, a dagger, or a dirk concealed on one's person, or for a convicted felon to possess a switchblade or gravity knife. Most other states have banned switchblade knives. Under federal law, it is ILLEGAL to mail, carry, or ship a switchblade or gravity knife across state lines.

Hi! guys......I've been hoping to find a multi-tools that has got a cockscrew included within, but to no avail. While I've spotted some models of the swiss army knives that've the pliers and a cockscrew included, the pliers in them're indeed a bit too limited in use. For me, the pliers, the two blades, a few philips heads and a cockscrew are the most often called for tools. Does anyone heard of some new models that's the all-important cockscrew built-in? Or, anyone've an idea to pull the cock out of a wine bottle with those existing tools?



# Carter, the Cutlery Collector My Hobby

I have been collecting pocket knives and edged tools since I was ten years old. That was in 1948 when I joined the Cubs.

The Problem of Classification

Since most of the sellers here are not experts but are cleaning out drawers, selling off estate sale remnants, etc., I see a lot of odd terms used which essentially mean nothing to me as a specialist and nothing to me as a generalist, either. What, for example, does "Vintage" mean? That refers to a year of a harvest for wine. Nothing else that I know of. How can cutlery be vintage? And so on. On the other hand the categories used by specialists are too esoteric for the public to use, as they are too subjective. I cannot use the NKCA categories because they are too high on the scale of condition for the general run of used knives, plus that, I collect. So here are my categories, which are akin to a checklist and can be applied by the layman. Along with the illustrations usually included, they will serve to eliminate a lot of correspondence. As to specialist terms, we can dispense with them. Just state whether the knife is mixed metal, brass, steel and nickel silver, etc. or all steel. That should help considerably.

# **CARTER'S CUTLERY CONDITION CATEGORIES** (This is how I call them.)

**One:** Factory new. Still in the packing with labels, etc. Quite often considered as mint, which is really a coinage term.

**Two:** Shelf wear. Stock wear. A little bumped and dinged. Never sharpened. Could be equated with unissued.

**Three:** Lightly sharpened. Pocket wear. All markings and etchings clearly visible. No rust or dirt down in the joints.

**Four:** Well used, complete. All original. May have been polished, cleaned, but not buffed. I prefer good clean patina.

**Five:** All original. Rusty, raggedy, heavily pitted. A hole filler 'til a better one shows up. Heavily ground. Buffed 'til the contours are changed.

**Six:** Scrap metal. Broken blades. Missing parts. Rotten flaky grips. Chips. Ground 'til the contour is changed.

And all sorts of gradations, plus or minus, for the higher ones. Personal markings are interesting and do not detract from the item's interest. For many, they enhance. A good well-kept condition three with markings is desirable to me.
