Barr Brothers Once Again Dennis Ellingsen

I have written about the Barr Brothers on several occasions because of I looked at these knives and started to wonder how these knives could my interest in knives that were made in Eugene, Oregon. The knives date from 1891 until 1911. To review the article and history which appeared in our April 2006 Knewslettter go to our web site. (From the first page of the web site look under articles.)

Knives made during this period have been difficult to find as they were used, abused and discarded, especially the hunting style knives. I have two hunting style knives that I know were made in Eugene, Oregon.




The top knife and the fourth knife down were made in Eugene, Oregon.

One is a leather re-handled WWII style which was stamped made in Eugene. The other knife has the original bone handles, a taper tang and the correct history which convinced me that it was made in Eugene. However I now have additional information about the leather rehandled knife as a result of a recent discovery by my chiropractor and myself. Sure the blade stated Eugene, but was it a taper tang? My chiropractor, who is a good friend, is also my back's good friend. So when I have a problem.... I go to Doctor Strom.

I have been gathering a few more specimens of hunting/fighting type knives that I had discovered on eBay. All the marks were Barr Bros (no location). Barr Bros moved to Oakland, California in 1911. Their main thrust after this move was spring eye sack needles, kitchen knives and metal products. Hunting style knives were even rarer with the Oakland stamp on them. But suddenly I had four hunting style knives that looked surprisingly like the theater knives of WWII. The blade styles were similar, and the theater-style handles and fittings were pointing to blades that were revamped by service men to suit their individual likes. This was a common practice in the Pacific Theater during that war.

have come from Eugene, Oregon, go through WWII and find their way to eBay. But wait I said.... maybe they were made in Oakland and

given to the war effort. I recall seeing a Life Magazine article of February, 1943 that highlighted the effort to have knives donated to the war effort. The article was titled "Save a Life with a Knife"; M.H. Cole highlights this story in his book.

Knives of all kinds, that were not under military contract, were donated to a knife poor WWII effort in the Pacific battles. Bill & Debbie Wright have a book available that addresses these knives and the commercial knives that were enhanced and modified during this period. The book is Theater Made Military Knives of World War II. So when comparing the Barr Brothers

knives I had purchased, they certainly appeared to have been from this era. But the burning question was whether these blades were made in Eugene, Oregon (pre 1911) or Oakland, California (post 1911).

I started my campaign of asking those in the know about this subject and those who might know. I could not formulate any hard solid facts on this subject. So from there the old scalp was getting sore from all the scratching. And then one day I had an epiphany. The general trend of making knives, be they hunting or kitchen, had been the handmade hammer forge technique. This basically meant that steel was heated and hammered into shape and then ground to the configuration that would make a suitable blade. By using this technique it was possible to save steel by tapering the blades. The meat of the blade thickness was full, and the handle portion was beaten to a smaller thickness resulting in a taper.

Obsidian Percussion Flaking Basics Eric Bergland

Introduction:

Something our ancestors learned over two million years ago was this: when you strike the right kind of rock with another rock, at the correct angle and with the correct amount of force, you can fracture the rock and make extremely sharp edges. Our ancestors were clever, manipulative creatures; and they found this to be a most useful discovery.

In this article I'll pass along some of the basics of obsidian "percussion flaking." Percussion flaking is one of the techniques in flint knapping (the shaping of stone by controlled fracture). I first flint knapped in 1977, while at the University of Oregon's Archeology field school. We were given a demonstration by Lee Spencer, a graduate student. Lee explained the basic principles, demonstrated them, guided us through our first clumsy efforts, and provided a list of necessary tools and materials. After that well-grounded first step, I got the necessary gear together, obtained some obsidian, and started breaking rock...

Equipment:

For starters, you'll need the following: (1) plenty of band aids; (2) leather work gloves; (3) a smooth, dense, durable rock for a *hammer stone* (egg-shaped to oblong, about 3-4" x 4-5"); (4) another stone (of about the same size) with a rough surface texture for an abrader. For the *abrader*, I recommend a water-worn pebble of vesicular basalt (vesicular basalt has many small holes throughout).

I strongly urge use of the following protective gear: high top leather work boots; safety glasses or goggles; sturdy jeans and a long sleeve work shirt; a dust mask rated for "free silica." Flint knapping generates lots of hazardous debris, from microscopic particles to long flakes

(with edges ten times sharper than a brand-new surgical scalpel).

It's best to be seated above the piles of sharp debris. I recommend a seating height of about 16-18".

Terminology:

Now a few words about flint knapping jargon. The *core* is the piece of obsidian raw material you'll reduce. The *stiking platform* is the area on the core where you'll land each blow. *Flakes* are what you'll produce as you reduce the core. There will be many flakes produced in the reduction of a large core, some useful, but many just waste. The objective of this percussion flaking task will be to produce large, sharp flakes. (In subsequent issues I'll tell how to reduce these large flakes into *bifaces*, and from that stage into knife blades or projectile points). What will also result from this exercise is the remnant core, which will look a great deal like the so-called "choppers" associated with our ancient hominid ancestors.

Raw Material:

Ideally, the obsidian should be free of visible cracks, large gas bubble holes (vesicles) or inclusions of pumice. These are flaws which will hinder your controlled reduction. The best obsidian for beginners, in my opinion, is smooth-textured, and black, grey or greenish black in color.


You'll see from the illustration that the angle between the platform and the outside surface of the core needs to be 90 degrees or less. This is important! It is best for beginners to pick irregularly-shaped blocks or nodules of obsidian, rather than smooth, rounded pebbles (which, if used, require a different reduction approach altogether).

Reduction:

Handle the core, turn it over and over, and examine each surface. Find a reasonably flat, natural striking platform whose angle, with the adjoining surface, is 90 degrees or less. Hold the core in your left hand (or rest it on the floor or ground if it's too heavy). Now, swing your arm in a smooth, strong, fast sweep, from about 12-16" above the core. Strike a glancing blow with the hammerstone end, near the outward edge of the platform. (If you strike past about 1" in from the platform edge, probably nothing will happen). If your hammer stone is too light, nothing will happen. But, if your hammer stone is the correct weight, if the platform angle was correct, if you struck with the correct amount of force, at the correct angle, and if you were using good obsidian of sufficient size, then a flake or flakes would've come flying off the core. Pick the flake up and re-fit it to the core. You did it!

You'll note that the flake removal left a concave scar on the core. The side margins of this scar form ridges with the original core surface. Now, follow on back up to the platform area. If there's a sharp, thin edge where the flake came off, grind this away with sharp, quick slapping blows with the abrader. Otherwise, your next flake removal blows may crush through that thin edge and produce nothing.

Don't be too discouraged if the technique I've outlined doesn't work for you right away. Remember, you're working at about the same skill level as a ten-year old trying to drive that first nail. Just keep practicing...



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Custom Knife Competition

At the April Show there were suggestions that we introduce a new category for judging. After the usual discussions, we decided to call it "Hand Made Knife", as opposed to handmade knives which covers all the other categories.

Basically this will be a knife made the "old fashioned way" ie. by hand. Only basic tools will be used: drill press, grinder, forge, files, etc...



Obviously we don't expect you to use a waterwheel to drive that drill press or grinder or even a coal fired forge (although that was discussed). We do expect a product that was made the old fashioned way. No belt sanders, epoxy, profile grinders, pyrometers or any of the trappings of a modern shop.

The biggest point of discussion was how we would enforce the rules. The answer is that we won't. This will be strictly on the honor system, as with all the other categories. If we get too many complaints about cheating, we will drop the category.

Here are the rules:

What you may use:

Electric drill press or hand drill

Electric grinder

Gas fired forge

Only materials and tools generally existing before 1860

Lots of sweat

What you cannot use:

Belt sanders

Acetylene torches or arc welders

Glues or methods that did not exist before 1860 (yes that is an arbitrary date)

Computer driven methods or machines This is the partial list, but you get the idea.

This is an open category that can be any kind of knife you want to make. We hope this will be an opportunity for the young fellows to experience what things were like "in the day" and for the old fellows to strut their stuff.

One additional rule: ALL the work must be done by the person who submits the knife. We do allow some specialized work to be done in the other categories as long as its disclosed, but not in this one.

Which brings us to the custom knife judging. Here are a few thoughts from the guy who rules the competition:

- 1. READ THE RULES--that will save a lot of time and argument.
- 2. Full disclosure of any work not done by the maker is required. We don't want knives made by committee.
- 3. This contest is on the honor system. If winning is more important than the respect of your peers, then you have a problem that can't be solved by an award.
- 4. Our judges are the best we can find from the membership. They are not perfect, but there is surprisingly little argument when it comes to choosing the best of category or show. It usually jumps out at you.
- 5. I do not participate in the judging. I present the entries to the judges and try to get the whole process over with as quickly as possible between 2 and 4. The primary reason for this is the makers want their knives back on their tables as quickly as possible.

A WORD ABOUT THE CUSTOM KNIFE JUDGING John Priest

This is information that will be especially important for those who wish to enter the custom knife competition. It might even increase your odds of winning.

Read the rules which are included in the papers in your Show packet which you will receive after you have checked in. Especially those parts that pertain to categories, disclosure and new makers.

Every year we get several knives that are obviously in the wrong category. Before you choose, think about whether it really fits.



On every entry there is a place to disclose what part of the knife (if any) was not done by the person entering it. This would be things like engraving, scrimshaw, specialized heat treating, etc. The maker is responsible for conceiving and executing the knife, not just assembling parts. The judges are looking at the basic knife and will take into account any special embellishments that couldn't reasonably have been done by the maker.

And now for the judges. These guys know what they're doing. Knife judging is highly subjective, so we try to get people with differing tastes who will balance out. However, they all know what to look for in a winning knife. In the last eight years they have differed some on the category winners but have been unanimous on the Best of Show.

The judging this year will take place Friday, April 17, 2009.

We will start accepting the knives at 2 PM and stop at 4 PM. The judging takes place starting at 4 PM, and the winners will be announced after the judging. We expect about 100 entrants and encourage everyone to enter, but please do your part. Read the rules that will be included in your Show packet and enter early.

The categories for the Custom Knife Competition are:

ART KNIFE BOWIE KNIFE DAMASCUS KNIFE (You must forge your own blade) FIGHTING KNIFE FOLDING KNIFE HAND FORGED (Non Damascus) HAND MADE KNIFE (Like done before 1860) **HUNTING-UTILITY KNIFE** MINIATURE KNIFE **NEW MAKER**

There will be one knife designated as **BEST of SHOW**.

This year we will again allow any OKCA Club member to submit a knife into the New Maker category. The knife must be presented in person, and you do not have to be a tableholder for this category. A New Maker is one who has not entered custom competition ever before. You must be a tableholder to enter all other categories.

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



My rough rule of thumb was the taper tang was the project. There was a question of how to x-

indeed a taper tang. But sad to say the four

knives in question were not taper tang construction. So from this information I would have to conclude that these four were a product of Oakland, California, Oh well.

Many custom made knives today feature a taper tang design. From my point of view there are two things being said. One is that the knife is a handmade knife, and the other is that the taper tang is a cosmetically appealing pattern. I like taper tang knives, be they today made or twixt 1891 and 1911.

So the thought was that if I could see if the tangs of my special made knives were straight or tapered I could ascertain the location they were made. Taper tang for Eugene and straight tang for Oakland. I had lost my ability to use my own x-ray vision when I got too close to the Kryptonite rock so an alternative source had to be found. And this brought me to my chiropractor who had an x-ray machine.

I was nervous about asking about x-ray for fear it would make me appear crazy and also be refused. But that was hardly the case. Doctor Strom was enthusiastic about


From grinding to Award knife

Display awards for the 2009 Show were blades that were used in the grinding competition at the 2008 Show. Ford Swauger created the Damascus from 15N20 and 1095 steel. Steven Strauch provided the Japanese style pattern and Larry Criteser modified the pattern to make it compatible for the grinding competition. Larry profiled 12 blanks for the competition.

Jose Diaz from Ellensburg, Washington, has enhanced this blade to make a knife using stabilized mango wood for the handle. The bolster is colored epoxy. The heat treatment was done in salt bath and quenched in molten salts. His web page is http://www.diaztools.com/
