

### English Army Standardized Pattern Kukris Ted Fitzwater

Mark 1 through Mark 5. (Pictures start on page 4)

Mark 1: Introduced in 1903, generally thought that production stopped in 1915; but it may have been produced as late as 1917. Generally it is a good size kukri (Picture 1), and there are several variations. The primary identification feature is how the handle is secured to the blade. Up to the introduction of the Mark 1, most kukris had a half tang that secured the blade to the handle. (Diagram 2) The Mark 1 had a rat-tail tang which goes all the way through the handle. It is secured by a round, slotted nut that is counter-sunk flush to the butt of the handle. (Picture 3 and Diagram 4) The blade length may vary from 13-1/4" to 14" and weigh 24 oz to 33 oz. Some Mark 1 may be found with a leather covered metal sheath.

Mark 1's can be found with no markings whatsoever, but some have been seen with the following manufacturers marks: CO--Cosspare Armoury

FW--Fort Williams in Calcutta OU--Ouetta RP--Rawalpindi E.Botta Singh & Son Rawalpndi

Mark 2: First produced in 1915 and was made as late as 1947. The Mark 2 has a full, flat tang with two rivets. The early Mark2 has two rings on the handle which help the hand from slipping when striking an object. The ring can be found on some Mark 2 up to the early stages of WWII. (Picture 5)

Blade length in my collection vary from 12-5/8" to 13-1/4" with weights of 22.4 oz to 25.6 oz.

The purpose of the article is to look at English military kukris, patterns Another variation of the Mark 2 is a kukri called the M43. Primary identification of the M43 is the rivets which are recessed into the handle, and the M43 may be stamped on the handle near the bolster. I have heard two trains of thought on the M43: It is just a contractor variation; or it was produced to simplify manufacturing techniques, the bolster being welded rather than braised on. (Picture 6)

> Blade length of the M43 in my collection is 13" and weight is similar to a standard Mark 2, 25.5 oz.

> There is a short M43 variation which has the recessed rivets; the same as the long M43, but the blade is only 10-7/8" long and weighs 20.1 oz. There is speculation that they were made for tank and aircraft crews. (Picture 7)

Fake M43's

I have seen at least two kukris sold on eBay with fake M43 stamps. Do your research; know what you are buying!

Mark 3: The Mark 3 was introduced in 1943. It has a full, flat tang with a steel butt cap; it was clearly made for ease of production. The longevity of the Mark 3 is up to debate. The Mark 3 was used by the Indian Army in great numbers up to the 1980s. How long the British Army used the Mark 3 is my big question mark. I have seen Mark 3's stamped LD with a broad arrow dating to the 1960s, and another Mark 3 marked KED 1975 with a broad arrow. Are they true blue, I just don't know; and the experts can't tell for sure either.

The true World War I Mark 3 is hard to come by. Atlanta Cutlery had a few, but they are long gone. (Picture 8) The Mark 3s I have in my collection have a blade length which varies from 11-3/4" to 12-1/2" and weigh from 19 oz to 26 oz.

Manufacurers stamps and Markings for the Mark 3: MIL--Military Industries WCS--Windless Steel Company CMW--Located in Calcutta DKW--Unknown K45--K stands for kukri and the 45, the year of manufacture HW--Unknow, but it could stand for a city called Harwar located between Almora and Dharadun India. Both Almora and Dharadun served Gurkha Regimental centers. LD64--Unknown KED1975--Unknown RGR--Unknown. This stamp was on a very nice modified Mark 3. SA--A proof mark found on some kukris made prior to India's independence in 1947. SA stands for small arms.

Mark 4: This is one of the rarest of the military kukris, and at a glance it looks very similar to Mark 3 in appearance. (Picture 9) However

## Another List Mike Silvey

As knife collectors we have lists: sometimes written, sometimes not, maybe just carried in our heads. Our list may be organized according to pattern, maker, or some other category of our choice. Our list defines our

quest and measures our progress towards our goal. It's the collection we want to put together.

My focus in collecting over the past few years has been U.S. Navy folders of the 19th century, and the list I've been working on is ever changing. It started with just the four knives M. H. Cole drew up in his books on U.S. Military Knives. I was impressed with these distinctive rope knives with "U.S. Navy" deeply stamped into the center of their single blades. I was fortunate to learn of similar knives from fellow collectors like Adrian Van Dyk, (who had assembled a collection before everyone else did) and from research. As time went by my checklist expanded as new specimens were found. Here is what the U.S. Navy rope knifemaker list looks like at this point in time:

1. No maker mark, scored bone handles, "United States Navy" on the blade. Circa 1800.

2. E.J. Higgins, checkered bone handles, "Don't Give Up The Ship" on the blade. Circa 1820.

3. Wilson, Hawksworth and Moss, "U.S. Navy" on the blade. Stag handles. Circa 1835

4. Wilson, Hawksworth, Ellison & Co, "U.S. Navy" on the blade. Stag handles. Circa 1846

5. Warne Cheever & Co., "U.S. Navy" on the blade, wood handles. Circa 1850.

6. J. Cox & Sons Celebrated Cutlery, "U.S. Navy" on the blade, stag handles. Circa 1850.

7. Thomas Turner & Co, private purchase and etched "U.S. Navy" on the blade. Stag handle. Circa 1850.

8. Joseph Jeffries, "U.S. Navy" stamped on the blade, stag handles. Circa 1850.

9. George Wostenholms IXL Cutlery, "U.S. Navy" stamped on the blade, stag handles. Circa 1860.

10. Tally-Ho C.T. Bingham, "U.S. Navy" stamped on the blade, stag handles. Circa 1860.

11. H.H. Taylor & Brother, "U.S. Navy" stamped on the blade, stag handles. Circa 1860.

12. Chapin & Phipps Celebrated Cutlery, "U.S. Navy" stamped on the blade, stag handles. Circa 1870.

13. F. Westpfal Acme, "U.S. Navy" stamped on the blade, second cut stag handles. Circa 1875.

# 14. Alfred Field & Co., "U.S. Navy" stamped on the blade, stag handles. Circa 1880.15. Smith Brothers, "U.S. Navy" stamped on the blade, stag handles.

15. Smith Brothers, "U.S. Navy" stamped on the blade, stag handles. Circa 1885.

16. H.B. Claflin & Company, "U.S. Navy" stamped on the blade, stag handles. Circa 1890.

17. Thomas Fenton, "U.S. Navy" stamped on the blade, stag handles. Circa 1890.

18. England, "U.S. Navy" stamped on the blade, stag handles. Circa 1890.

19. Cambridge & Co, "U.S. Navy" stamped on the blade, stag handles. Circa 1895.

20. J. Ward & Co., "U.S. Navy" stamped on the blade, stag handles. Circa 1898

21. Miller Brothers, "U.S. Navy" etched on the blade, jigged bone handles, gravity knife. Circa 1898.

22. Alfred Williams, "U.S. Navy" stamped on the blade, stag handles. Circa 1890–1920.

23. Challenge Cutlery Co., "U.S. Navy" stamped on the blade, stag handles. Circa 1900.

Almost all the knifemakers listed above were British manufacturers from Sheffield and discovering the history behind their marks can be a challenge. Besides the usual resources like *Levine's Guide* and Goins' *Encyclopedia of Cutlery Markings*, there are a few Sheffield resources that may be useful. (Thanks to Garry Zalesky for this information.)

with a closer look, it is of much higher quality and workmanship. The story that I have most often heard is that kukris in use were just not holding up, so a request was made to Wilkerson Sword Company. They produced 1400 very high quality Mark 4s. What happened to them, most experts believe, is that they were shipped to Malaya and simply used up. The jungle climate is very hard on everything. Another story I have hears is that the Gurkhas didn't like them. The metal was too hard and could not be sharpened properly with the chakmak provided with the Mark 4 (the chakmak is a sharpening steel provided with each kukri). Who knows, they could be sitting in a warehouse someplace. If you suspect you have one, the first thing you will note is that they are made with very high quality. The ones I have seen are stamped WCS 51. There are general proof marks, (Diagram 10); and the tang is chrome plated to reduce on corrosion. The chakmak and karda (the karda is a small utility knife provided with a kukri) will also have the WCS stamp, if original to the Mark 4. Value will depend on condition, on eBay recently one was on auction starting at \$1,580.00. It had both chakmak, karda and original sheath; but it did not sell until it was reduced at auction to \$900.00

**Mark 5:** The Mark 5 was introduced in the 1960s and is still in use by the British Gurkhas. It is lighter and of a smaller size then previous kukris used by the British Gurkhas. The Mark 5 is produced in Nepal, and most are unmarked; but I have one stamped ORDEP NEPAL 1/81. The seller told me that it came out of a Gurkha unit in Iraq. They have a rat-tail tang with brass bolster, butt cap and a black horn handle. Quality will vary from very good to tourist grade. The Mark 5 is issued with a *chakmak* and *karda*, also with black horn handles. In Jonathan Sedwell's paper the 20th Century British Military Patter Gurkha Issue Kukris, he states there are three grades of Mark 5: ceremonial, issue and training grade kukris. (Picture 11) In my collection they have blade lengths of 10-3/4" to 11" and weigh 14.0 oz.


I can take very little credit for the contents of this paper, I have borrowed very heavily from Jonathan (Spiral) Sedwell's paper the 20th Century British Military Pattern Gurkha Issue Kukris. His paper can be found at the International Kukri Research and Historical Society (IKRHS) website under articles. If you are interested in kukris, the IKRHS has a great deal of outstanding information on the subject.

I would like to thank Simon Hengly of Tora Blades for providing me with pictures of the Mark 1 and Mark 4 kukris. Tora Blades also has a website with a collector's forum.










Picture 5-Mark 2 kukris top to bottom


**A.** This is the earliest kukri in my collection - DHW1919. It has an overall length 17-1/4", blade length 13-3/8" and weight 22.9 oz. You will note the notches filed just above the markings; there are a total of seven. Five across the top and two in front of the cho-religious notch. These could be for years of service, unit designation, plain old vandalism or head chopped off.

**B.** M.A.D. 41 note the rings on the handle. Overall length 13-1/2", blade length 12-3/4" and weight 24.3 oz.

C. Pioneer Calcutta 1944, overall length 17-1/2", blade length 13-1/2" and weight 28.7 oz.

D. ATD 42 overall length 17", blade length 13" and weight 27.4 oz.

**E.** SNB41 is a very rough manufacturing and a lot of sharpening. Overall length 17-1/4", blade length 13" and weight 24 oz.



**Picture 6-**Full length M43, note the M43 stamp just in front of the handle. Also note the SA stamp on the handle just in front of the bolster that you may not be able to see. The rivets holding the handle on are not as clearly recessed on the top long bladed M43 as the below short blade.

B. K45 Mark 3. There is a broad arrow above the K45 stamp and the handle has a broad arrow and an SA stamp on the opposite side of the handle. Overall length 16-3/4", blade length 11-3/4" and weight 19.8 oz.

**C.** HW 45. There is an SA stamp above the HW45. I could not find any other markings. Overall length 16-3/4", blade length 12" and weight 22.2 oz.

**D.** LD 64 Mark 3. A pattern made after WWII. The markings are very poor which is not uncommon. Overall length 16-3/4", blade length 12-1/2" and weight 23.1 oz.

**A.** Standard issue Mark 5 that was presented to U.S. Special Forces member R. P. Mohs by the 1/2 Gurkhas in 1978. Overall length 14-1/4", blade length 10-3/4" and weight 14.0 oz.

**B.** Ceremonial Mark 5. Chrome plated and stamped ORDEP 1/81. Overall length 15-5/8", blade length 10-7/8" and weight 14.6 oz.

**C.** Ceremonial Mark 5. A highly polished steel blade. Overall length 15-5/8", blade length 11" and weight 16.4 oz.

### Oregon Knife Collectors Club Knife 2011

The Great Eastern Cutlery Sunfish is this year's Oregon Knife Collectors' Club 2011 knife. A mock up of this knife is shown here but will be moderately modified. The knife will be in the style and fashion as all our Club knives.



The handles will be jigged bone, and

a shield of a beaver will be a one-of-a kind shield for this knife. The pattern number is 362211 and marked Northfield which is their premium line. The length is 4-1/4" and the two blades are 1095. The main blade will have a double pull. The total of 50 knives will be serial numbered and will come in the Northfield cardboard roll so familiar with this company. Serial numbers will be randomly drawn, but you can request the same serial number you had for the 2010 knife. Membership in the OKCA required to purchase this knife.

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### An Interesting Western Martin Drivdahl



History of the origin and growth of Western States Cutlery Company involving the joining of two prominent knifemaking families by the marriage in 1891 of Debbie Case to Harvey Nixon (H.N.) Platts is certainly a fascinating story of courage, faith and perseverance. Had H.N. not developed "grinders consumption" and not decided for health reasons to move his family west to Boulder, Colorado, history would have been differently written and the WESTERN STATES and WESTERN brand would never have come into existence.

As a kid growing up on a small cattle and sheep range near Big Timber, Montana, I knew nothing of this history or of the family makers of Western knives. I always knew my

Dad carried a three blade WESTERN stockman's knife in his pocket, and it was well used for many tasks. The spey blade was saved for the sole purpose of castrating calves and docking lambs. I guess the spark was set early-on in my youth, and ever since I've always perked up when my eyes see the WESTERN STATES or WESTERN stamp on sheath or folding knives.

At a gun show in Helena last spring, I came across a very unusual looking sheath knife. Everything about it, from my first glance to



closer examination, accelerated my heart rate; and I knew I had to have it.

I will digress here for a bit to mention that thanks to my free ad in this OKCA publication earlier last spring, I fortunately obtained a copy of *The Knife Makers Who Went West* published in 1978 by Harvey Platts (grandson of H.N. Platts). I got it just in time to bone up and put to memory at least some of what Harvey Platts wrote about the history of his company's sheath knives. When my eyes lit on the words imprinted on the leather sheath of one particular knife at a dealer's table, I just



couldn't resist. Printed on the beautiful, polished leather sheath were the stamped words "WESTERN STATES CUT. & MFG. CO." arranged in a complete 180 degree arch over the stamped image of a bronc rider atop a bucking horse. Beneath the bucking horse, in a less pronounced upward cupped arc, were the stamped words "BOULDER, COLO."

Description of knife: Current blade length - 4-1/4" Aluminum half guard: Overall knife length - 8-1/2"


Ricasso stamping WESTERN STATES in an arc over CUT CO. BOULDER, COLO. (see photo)

Black Bakelite decorative handle with a football shaped nickel silver shield engraved with W. (buffalo skull) S. (see photo)

Removable screw-on butt cap with a 5/8" dia. x 2-1/4" deep match safe. Blade has very prominent swedges both sides form tip of blade extending back for 2-3/4".

Based on the information in Chapter 5 of Harvey Platts' book, I will make the following observations and comments:

1. An interesting quote on p.78 of the Platts' book, "When the company began the manufacture of sheath knives in 1928, they stamped 'Western'. In 1931, when the double-tang knives went into production, the words 'Pat. Pend.', 'Patented' or 'Pat. No 1,967,479'



were added." I noted my find defies both of these two sentences and is definitely not constructed using double tang construction.

2. I did find the following clarification on page 79, "There are Western States sheath knives in existence marked with the curved pocket knife stamp."

3. The catalog page reprints in Harvey Platts' book for 1932 (Catalog No. 40) show the first of Western States sheath knives but does not include the knife I found nor is it shown on any other of the catalog page reprints contained in this book.

This knife seems very unique, having a shield on the handle (first I've ever seen on any sheath knife) and a built-in match safe or storage space, also a rare feature. The shield would almost seem to be a carry over from the folding knives made by the company, and the buffalo skull image is consistent with its use as an etch on the blades of early WESTERN STATES folding knives (started in about 1928). I believe the knife to perhaps be one of the very earliest (1928-1931) sheath knives produced by Western States Cutlery Company. I treasure it for its graceful appearance and unique features. If any of you readers have a similar knife, knowledge, or only printed information to shed more light, please contact me. (406)442-2783

### **Remember the Maine** ibdennis

In the last issue we ran a story by Mike Silvey on the Smith Bros. Navy Knife, and a reference was made to the ship the USS Maine. I received

an email from Hank Hansen from Indiana about this subject. Hank has an Ulster take-apart knife fork and spoon that has an etch on the main blade "Remember the Maine."

The USS Maine was the United States Navy's second commissioned predreadnought battleship. She is best known for her catastrophic loss in Havana harbor. The USS Maine had been sent to Havana, Cuba, to protect U.S. interests during the Cuban revolt against Spain. On the evening of 15 February 1898, she suddenly exploded and swiftly sank, killing nearly three quarters of her crew. Though then, as now, the cause and responsibility for her sinking were unclear; popular opinion in the U.S. blamed Spain, and the sinking (popularized in the phrase Remember the Maine, to Hell with Spain!) was one of the precipitating events of the Spanish-American War.

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The photo Hank sent gives you a glimpse of the etch and reminds us of the fact this knife goes back more than 100 years. Hank graciously rejected my offer to buy this treasure and suggested that it might be cheaper to purchase a new Mercedes Benz. I knew that would happen. What a treasure.
