

KNIVES, FRIENDS AND WEALTH Another Knife Story Dan Westlind



Somewhere around 35 years ago, I met a doctor from Denver, Colorado, at the fossil show in Tucson, Arizona. At the time, I sold him some fossil ivory and a couple knives with ivory handles. Over the years we became good friends; and I did a lot of work for him, restoring fossils and selling him fossil ivory, and an occasional knife, especially if it had fossil walrus or mammoth ivory for the handle.

One particular knife I sold him was one I had done some experimenting with to the Damascus blade. The blade had several different

patterns in it, and I put in some decorative pins in patterns of dice. I made the blade, drilled holes for the pins, finished and heat treated the blade and put the pins in the pre-drilled holes. I peened the pins in and spun the heads. I then etched the blade and polished the blade afterwards, giving the brass and nickel silver pins their bright finish. The handle was carved from a piece of fossil walrus ivory that I got from the late Jim Hunter of Hunter's Fossil Ivory in Springfield, Oregon. It was carved into a beautiful snake with a skull at the top. The handle may not be to everyone's liking, but it fit the recurve blade that was in the style of a fighter. There was just something about this knife that gave it an appeal that brought a lot of attention. I hated to sell it; but as we all know, the money was needed. Over the years, I would have loved to buy the knife back; but I was never able to come up with the \$1,500.00 the doctor had paid for the knife. I often mentioned that knife to the doctor, and he said he loved that knife also and did not want to part with it.

A few weeks ago was my birthday, which depresses me as I know I am getting older and my health has gotten worse. I am no longer able to forge much and cannot put the hours in the shop that I used to and still want to. I got lots of "Happy Birthday" wishes from my friends on Facebook, and that helped take away the depression. The afternoon of my birthday, I went to get the mail; and there was a box from the doctor. I opened the box and there was a note saying, "Happy Birthday, here is a token of appreciation for being my friend and for all the work you have done for me over the years." You guessed it, there was the knife. I had made that knife in July of 1999. Twenty years go by and I get the knife back, for free. I have never been wealthy by any means and know I never will be in terms of money and finances. My wealth is measured by the friends I have, and I may be one of the wealthiest guys around. Most of my wealth came from the people I have met at knife shows over the years, and I hope to add to my wealth in the years to come.

The deadline for first right on your 2019 table for 2020 is December 15, 2019. The December Winter/Mini Show will be an opportunity to pay your money. We have been receiving payment for the 2020 Show. We do have a waiting list for tables. There is a table application and membership application in this Knewslettter, as well as an application on our website. If you have difficulty downloading the form, please call; and I will mail one to you. A confirmation of your table reservation will be mailed after January 1, 2020.

Please note the section for the second name requested for the table-holder badge. We limit the table-holder badges to two per table-holder. The badges have the individual's name (company name if available) and city and state. Because of the work involved to print the badges, we must limit them. It also reduces the number of people behind each of the tables. The table-holder badges are picked up at the Show in the lobby of the Exhibit Hall on the day of the Show.

We have now, as of this Knewslettter, made a decision regarding the 2020 OKCA Club knife. It will be a Great Eastern two blade trapper pattern. The handle material has not been decided,

but it will be natural (bone, stag, or wood). We will order 102 of the knives. All of the knives will have the OKCA logo (the beaver). Fifty of the knives will be numbered, 50 will have the logo but no number, two of the knives will be prototypes number #0 and #00. Thank you **Roy Humenick** for coordinating



this project with Great Eastern. We do not have a cost quotation from Great Eastern. As soon as that information is available, an application will be posted on our website, and the information will be posted on Facebook. The individuals who have previously purchased that number will have first right for the 2020 numbered knives. Those who have previously purchased the unnumbered knives will have first right on those. A waiting list will be started for those who wish to purchase a knife and have not previously ordered a knife. Payment must accompany your order to secure your knife. Why I Collect Folding Bowies

Over many years I've been asked why I collect folding knives and not the big Bowies. It's a good question, since it seems that the real money is in the big Bowie knives. In the 80's I tried my hand in making custom knives, and I made (and sold) some 300 of them. I've never made a folding knife simply because they are much more difficult to make. I'm not alone, there are some highly regarded custom makers who never made a folder or gave up in disgust when they tried. So, long ago, I gained a respect for the folders; because they take a lot of talent to make: and there are far fewer available as a result.

Steve Miller wrote an article about the folding Bowie knife in *American Blade* magazine in 1973 and I was hooked! Before long I had sold out all my military stilettos and knuckle knives and was pursuing folding dirks and folding Bowies. That was 46 years ago and I've stuck with the folders ever since. Working my way up into the big folding Bowies took a long time, but persistence and good luck has paid off. Here are three photos of some of my favorites

that I keep at the bank here in "tornado alley." The first box is all "Spring Dirks" (switchblades), there and are two more in the second box. Since intricate mechanical things fascinate me, it was natural that the switchblades from over 160 years ago would be high on my list of favorites. While I can appreciate a big beautiful Bowie knife, and especially those made by the early American makers, I would suggest that you take a closer look at the knives that fold. In some cases

they are every bit as rare and well made as some to the most highly regarded American Bowies. At this point they are still underpriced, but I



see that changing more and more as they're "discovered." These are the reasons why I collect folders.

DISPLAY TABLES will be around the perimeter of the room. Displays are eligible for display awards, which are hand-made knives donated by members and supporters of OKCA. Display judging will be by rules established by OKCA. Special category awards may also be offered. NOTHING MAY BE SOLD FROM DISPLAY TABLES.

SALE/TRADE TABLES Sharing of tables will not be allowed. Exhibitors must comply with all applicable local, state, and federal laws. Oregon has NO SALES TAX.

CITY AND COUNTY REGULATIONS require that there be:

However, it is *ILLEGAL* to carry a switchblade knife, a gravity knife, a dagger, or a dirk concealed on one's person, or for a convicted felon to possess a switchblade or gravity knife. Most other states have banned switchblade knives. Under federal law, it is *ILLEGAL* to mail, carry, or ship a switchblade or gravity knife across state lines.


Details on Mini Show

Pearl Utility Knives

First we need to determine what is referenced when the term scout knife is used. One could think that it is a knife sanctioned by the scouting organizations. Then again, one could be referring to a utility knife that exhibits, generally, four blades: master blade, punch, can opener and screwdriver/cap lifter. Or any combination, plus more. In other words, not all utility knives are scout knives; but, most, if not all, scout knives are utility knives. Then there is the question, "What Is Pearl?" refer to the October *Knewslettter* for the David Schultz article.

To avoid confusion, this article will reference Mother of Pearl (MOP) (Nacre) as just pearl.



Most of us know that pearls are used to grace necklaces for ladies that can cost a bazillion dollars. But this is not the same product that goes to make a knife handle. The material that is used is called mother of pearl or nacre. It is often referred to as MOP. This is the inner shell layer of a mollusk. It is colorful and can be used to enhance knife handles. Aside from its delightful colors, this material is brittle and can break easily. It is very necessary to use proper eye and face protection when it is ground or cut.

Utility/scout knives have many different handle materials, but usually materials that will stand up to the rigors of hard use and abuse. Bone was the early, most popular, choice, as well as handles of celluloid, delrin, plastic, stag and wood. The focus of this article is the scout/ utility knives that have pearl handles. Pearl is an unlikely choice for a common carry tool like a pocketknife, since it can frequently be damaged. Any slight

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pressure will crack the pearl, just as any drop from any height will also damage the pearl. So the question of note is, "Why would pearl be used on a scout/ utility knife?"



Small single or two blade pocketknives are common with pearl handles. They were made for the person who wanted an item of prestige and flaunt their status. These knives were functional for small tasks such as fingernail repair, thread cutting, letter and package opening. They normally were carried in a secure pocket and were protected from damage. It was easier for the cutler to acquire a piece of pearl to handle a small knife than a large knife. Because it was very eye catching with its changes of color, pearl was also marketed to the person who was purchasing a gift for that special someone or for that special presentation award. Many have endured the ravages of time; as they were put into special places, never used or carried and eventually forgotten. Pearl was used on pocketknives and often used on presentation awards.

I am a utility/scout knife collector, and it is a rare day when I find a pearl

handled scout/ utility knife. Even rarer is finding one in perfect condition, blades and pearl intact. If the knife has been used. the pearl would be damaged with cracks or chips. If one collects pearl knives, the

percentage of mint, unspoiled (whole, not split or cracked), pearl is about five percent, optimistically speaking. One can also add that an officially marked scout knife in pearl would usually be used and abused. That brings us to the nudge I got to write this article.

I was bidding on an Ulster Official Scout Knife on eBay which, aside from the blade stains, had a pronounced crack in the pearl handle. As a sample for our collection, it was desirable; so I reached deep into the pocket to bid on it. Not deep enough, as this knife approached the \$700.00 mark. Too rich for me. But it got me to thinking about the pearl utility/scouts we have. We have over 1,000 of the scout/utility patterns and only 12 are pearl. The two in perfect mint condition were presentation knives. The most rare of these knives was made by Ulster in the early 1920s. It was a scout pattern presentation knife to F. N. Cooke who was with the Boy Scouts of America. It carries a red BSA shield that was only used for special awards or acknowledgments. The knife had never been used, and it is without flaw.

The other pearl knives show testament to use as they are cracked, chipped and flea bit. Camillus, Cattaraugus, Ka-Bar, Pal Blade, Remington, Schrade Cutlery, Ulster and Union Cutlery were the companies that made handles of pearl for the scout/ utility patterns. These and many other cutlery companies made one and two blade Sunday knives in pearl. But even these are hard to find in undamaged condition.



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Teddy Roosevelt

It started out as a simple email to a group of historical firearms collectors. I included a picture of Teddy Roosevelt with a rifle in hand and a knife. The purpose was to just inject a visual in the reminder for a meeting date. I asked the simple question: who was the person in the picture and what was the rifle he was holding? I gave them the date of 1885 and noted it was not a Winchester Model 94. That picture generated comments beyond my wildest expectations.



I enjoy identifying firearms in old pictures, so I blew the picture up and started the process of elimination to identify the firearm. From the side plate, I knew it to be a Winchester. I suspected a Winchester Model 1873; on closer inspection it was determined to be a Winchester Model 1876. I based this on the cartridge belt that Teddy was wearing, and also the fact that this picture predated his trip to the West where he did some big game hunting.

Of course this then evolved into a search on the Internet for additional information. I discovered numerous pictures of Teddy in this famous studio picture shoot. I also discovered numerous accounts of his trip out West. The biggest find was the documentation that identified the rifle as a Winchester Model 1876 and the caliber to be a Winchester 45-75. So now this thread of information was beginning to grow. The 45-75 Winchester was the original chambering for the 1876 Centennial Rifle. Since the 1876 action could only handle cases no longer than 2-1/4 inches, the 45-75 case evolved which gave performance results similar to the 45-70. Further reading found that this rifle and cartridge were favored by Theodore Roosevelt for grizzly bears.

The next step was to magnify the picture and focus on the knife. It was a knife that still exists today. There are two knives that are accredited to Theodore Roosevelt that were passed down to the Roosevelt family.

The one knife that recently sold at auction was a presentation knife given by James W. Gerard to Teddy in 1909 before he left for his African hunting trip. The knife was quite ornate and made by Russell out of Massachusetts. The handle is in the shape of an eagle's head made of gold with garnets for the eyes. The guard has two wolves' heads sculpted in gold. The knife has an inscription stating it was presented to Theodore Roosevelt. The 1909 cost



was \$1,250.00 (today's dollars would be \$33,266.00). In 2016 it sold at auction for \$440,000.00, which was the highest recorded price for any knife ever sold.



The knife that is shown in the 1885 photo of Teddy, before he went to the West, was made by Tiffany; it still resides with the Roosevelt family. I suspect, were it to be put to auction, it also would hover in around the price level of the Russell knife.

This is where a simple photo turned into a fascinating historical search. The person, the firearm, the knife, the trip out to the West and some reading about this wonderful man. Did you know that Theodore Roosevelt did a whistle stop train tour to Eugene in 1911? Postcards showing him at the rear of the train while he delivered a speech can sometimes be found. I had an original one which I gave to my son who is a huge fan of Teddy and then just by luck found an original one for myself. Happy Teddy time!
