The Beginning

Someone recently asked me to recall and write the beginning of the Oregon Knife Collectors Association (OKCA). It was 1975 when a group of knife minded people gathered to see if it was feasible to have a knife show on the West Coast.

We had monthly meetings in the Eugene Water & Electric Board (EWEB) utilities basement here in Eugene, Oregon, once a month on Saturdays which was attended by Oregonians mostly. We called ourselves the "Emerald Empire Blade Collectors Association." Long about the first of 1976, we modified our name to "Emerald Empire Knife Collectors." I think this happened as most of the public had no idea what a "blade" was.

The only knife shows that were available were in conjunction with gun shows held in the area. It was always a travel-to-a destination. The big shows were even more unavailable, greater distances. How about a show in our area was the question? Something like, "If Mohammed can't go to the mountain, then bring the mountain to Mohammed." It was this drive that suggested that I would promote the interest of collectable cutlery and Wayne Goddard would promote the area of knifemaking.

We talked about doing a two day Show, and a search began to locate a place to hold the event. Portland was the prime consideration; however distance for the organizer (me), and the high cost of the Portland facilities were discouraging. So it was decided to hold it in Eugene on May 15-16, 1976. It was also decided to change our name one more time to include the state of Oregon rather than the city or area.

The Show was held at the Lane County Fairgrounds in the Pioneer Building. The Pioneer building was torn down in 1978.

There were 75 tables which included several pretty nice displays. We had three Gerber folding knives, enhanced with engraving on ivory micarta handles, presented in a custom wood box. These were given to the three best displays at the Show. The attendance was around 500 with a door admission of \$1.00.





That May Show proved that we could make a Knife Show happen in Eugene. In September of 1976, we drew up a Charter and promoted the organization at a September gun show. I had capped out all my credit cards prior to the May 1976 Show and doing that for future shows was not something I wanted to do. (I did get my monies back, but zero profit for me.) So,

How to make an Award Winning Display for 2020

So you still are wondering whether you should attempt to have a Military Display for the OKCA 2020 Show. Sure you do, but where do you start and what is needed? Well, let me give you a few tips I have garnered from those in the know; and if you are at all competitive, you may want an award winning display too. By covering all the bases, you may creep up past an equally rare display in the judge's points! So below are some display pointers and perhaps some winning tips.

Judging is broken down to three categories. Educational aspects, merit of items on display and public appeal. Let's take a short walk around each subject.

Educational aspects include for one, "Does the title fit the display and is the owner identified? Sure, a snappy title helps; but if it is off base from the collection itself, then prepare to lose points. Identifying yourself means the viewers can track you down, discuss what you have and may even pop up with a rare piece you have been looking for. Ask yourself, will your display educate a novice as well as an advanced collector?

Labeling is very important, you may know what you have but do others? I fell into this trap, not only failing to label the knives which were pretty well standalone knives, thus probably not needing explanation; but I also failed to label a piece of iron work saying IXL which came off the wall of the Wostenholm factory. When I was grousing about it, a judge said: "You didn't label it for all I knew you could have had someone make that for you. You missed some points there, buddy." Remember, you are there to educate so include catalog pictures, documentation, accessories or references. Lacking books, with the Web that research can be done pretty easy but watch out for misleading know-it-all opinions that lurk in the GOOGLE pages.

Merit of the items on display has three important aspects. One is condition, condition and condition. Pick your best examples and show them in a way that enhances their condition. Rarity of the displayed item does count, but are you properly explaining why the item is rare? There is a completeness category; or in another words, "How complete is your

display relative to availability of like items in the general marketplace?" is a judged factor.

The final judging grouping is Public Appeal. Does your really great collection just kind of lay there on a flat table or perhaps hard to see in a plywood box display just barely propped up on the table and just looking Plain Jane? When you're trying to sell your cool car, you don't show it off in a crammed up garage; people like to see it and walk around and kick the tires. Your display should be easily viewable to the public, and your supporting documents readable. The creativity in displaying your collection counts too. A plywood box full of rare knives is not going to get the same points as a fully labeled, upright, chrome and plexiglas, wowza display extravaganza that has similarly special knives.

But if you really want to win and put some effort in it, I hope you're a member of *Knife Magazine's* website that can pop you right over to the April 2005 issue and the December 2008 issue. The April 2005 issue "Knife Collections for Display" by Sheldon and Edna Wickersham highlights displays by many OKCA top dogs. The December 2008 issue called "Display with Imagination" by Larry Oden maps out great ideas. Also past May issues of our own *Knewslettter* have OKCA Show pictures with many award winning displays that can be seen for ideas. Read these articles, and you will be locked and loaded with winning ideas.

I do not want to discourage those who just want to make minimal effort to display some really rare military knives. Heck, I want to see them! But if you are there to win, play it smart, cover all the bases; because just like in elections, there are rules and the Electoral College count can sink your highly touted competitor's boat in a close race.


in September, we asked several of our members if they would like to invest in the next Show. We were sure the investment could be paid back, but it was clear that there would be no investment bonus. All agreed. The next Show in 1977 paid back our investors and gave us a cushion in our bank account.

There are two binding things that make the Oregon Knife Collectors a yearly success. The Knewslettter keeps the group together, and the support of the Show every year perpetuates its longevity. Our interest is focused on things that go cut, and we never have had a firearms show in conjunction with our Knife Show. Our attendance in the last 20 years has been between 3000 and 5000 people, and we have had visitors from all around the world visit or set up tables at our Show. I mean Africa, Asia, Australia, England and Europe.

Those early years were fun but hard work to make all this happen. Ray and I were the recipients of a Gerber award knife in 1976 for our scout/utility knife collection. Wayne Goddard showed the eight foot long folding knife he created. The Pioneer building is long gone to make room for the Convention

Center that now hosts our yearly Show. Elayne and I have been fixtures in the organization for the whole time.

ANY QUESTION OR DISPUTE arising during the Show shall be resolved by the Show Chairman, whose decision

THIS IS A KNIFE SHOW. All tables must be 90% knives or knife related items (e.g. swords, axes, edged tools, edged weapons, knife books, knifemaking supplies). If in doubt, check with the Show Chairman ahead of time. The OKCA reserves the right to bar any item from display or sale. No firearms may be sold or shown at this Show.

ALL EXHIBITORS are required to keep their tables set up throughout the public hours of the Show: 8 AM Saturday to 3 PM Sunday. ANY EXHIBITOR WHO LEAVES OR COV-**ERS THEIR TABLE BEFORE 3 PM SUNDAY FORFEITS** FUTURE RESERVATIONS AND WILL BE DENIED TABLES AT FUTURE OREGON KNIFE SHOWS.

DISPLAY TABLES will be around the perimeter of the room. Displays are eligible for display awards, which are hand-made knives donated by members and supporters of OKCA. Display judging will be by rules established by OKCA. Special category awards may also be offered. NOTHING MAY BE SOLD FROM DISPLAY TABLES.

SALE/TRADE TABLES Sharing of tables will not be allowed. Exhibitors must comply with all applicable local, state, and federal laws. Oregon has NO SALES TAX.

BADGES: Each table-holder is entitled to one additional Show badge. NO EXCEPTIONS.

KNIFEMAKERS who are present and are table-holders at this Show may enter knives in the knifemaking award competition.

FOR MORE INFORMATION on categories and judging criteria in the display and hand-made knife competitions, contact the Show Chairman.

SHOW FACILITATORS will be provided by OKCA from 10AM Friday until 4 PM Sunday. However, exhibitors are responsible for watching their own tables. Neither the OKCA nor the Lane Events Center will be responsible for any loss, theft, damage, or injury of any kind.

CITY AND COUNTY REGULATIONS require that there be:

- No Smoking within the Exhibit Hall at any time;
- No alcoholic beverages consumed within the Exhibit Hall during the public hours of the Show;
- No loaded firearms worn or displayed at the Show;
- No swords or knives brandished or displayed in a provocative manner.

Violators of these safety rules will be asked to leave.

NOTE ON SWITCHBLADES AND DAGGERS: In Oregon it is legal to make, sell, buy, or own switchblade knives. However, it is ILLEGAL to carry a switchblade knife, a gravity knife, a dagger, or a dirk concealed on one's person, or for a convicted felon to possess a switchblade or gravity knife. Most other states have banned switchblade knives. Under federal law, it is ILLEGAL to mail, carry, or ship a switchblade or gravity knife across state lines.

Laguiole Knives

Last winter during the few weeks my wife and I retreated from the snow and cold to stay at our little homestead in the northwest corner of Arizona, I found a most interesting knife at an antique shop. It had a strange and intriguing blade stamp I'd never seen before, and the shop owner thought it was French made. This knife is shown with the blade half opened in Photo #1.

The knife is a clasp style single-bladed knife with a closed length of 4-3/4". The blade measures 4-1/4" wide near the tang. Handles appear to be from some type of dark, colored horn with diagonally placed brass wire inlays to add to its artistic appeal. The bolsters are of brass and are cast integrally with the side scales. The most unique feature in the knife's construction is its semi-lockback mechanism. Incorporated into the tang of the blade is a notch that extends below the cam part of the tang by over 1/8". The free end of the knife spring has a lug that clicks down into the notch as the blade is fully opened. This mechanism provides quite a strong blade lock without being a total lock. Evidently the back side of the notch is cut at an angle of slightly less than 90 degrees to the force applied on closing the blade. This allows the lug to disengage when enough pressure is applied along the back of the blade.

Photo #2 is a closeup showing a portion of the blade tang and front bolster and reveals part of the locking lug on the spring. It also shows the blade stamping with LAGUIOLE in large letters on the top line, followed by 5 MEDAILLES D'OR on the second line. The bottom line is hard to make out, but the first letters look like C. BESSET. The marking, being quite a puzzle, resulted in prompting my wife to employ her smart phone to research the name LAGUIOLE for a start.

In the interest of information sharing, I offer herein material which consists of data and short articles taken directly from online sources. We learned first of all that LAGUIOLE is not the name of a knife manufacturer nor a registered cutlery trade brand. The word "LAGUIOLE," as currently used, is more a term for this particular style of knife, derived from its interesting early history. Perhaps the third line on the blade is the name of the cutler.

The origins and evolution of a symbol of French-made cutlery. From the outskirts of the Aubrac plateau...Jean-Pierre Calmels invented the first lockback pocketknife named Laguiole, a modest countryman's knife, in 1829. This knife combined elegance and functionality and eventually replaced the Capuchadou knife from Rouergue. Several artisanal blacksmiths produced the Laguiole knives until 1880. These knives were practical and useful tools, evolving according to each client's needs. Today the Laguiole knife is considered to be one of the most ancient French-made pocketknives.

Despite the fact that quality artisanal-made knives were being produced in Laguiole, an industry producing Laguiole knives was established in Thiers and its environs. Manufacturing knives has been the city of Thiers' principal activity for over 500 years. This industry was facilitated by the fact that all of the individual trades necessary for creating cutlery were present in Thiers.

Today, Laguiole knives are manufactured in Laguiole, as well as Thiers. In Thiers, the Laguiole knife manufacturing industry employs 430 individuals (240 of which are direct) and generates an annual turnover of more than 15 million Euros (17.5 million Euros in 2009). In Laguiole, approximately ten companies and artisans create 170,000 knives per year (figures from 2007). In Thiers, there are workplaces that have their roots in Laguiole and still produce in an authentic way, such as Fontenille Pataud and Laguiole en Aubrac. Together with Forge de Laguiole, they are the only ones who abide to the traditional production level. There are also a number of small workshops

that authentically produce beautiful and unique Laguiole knives on a (very) small scale and only on order. The real purists believe that Forge de Laguiole is the only real brand. They are the only ones based in the village of Laguiole itself and also produce from there. Photo #3 shows a LAGUIOLE knife made by Forge de Laguiole. This beautiful folding knife has detailed file work on the spine of the blade and handle and handsome ebony scales. Also features brass pins, brass bolsters and the traditional Laguiole Bee motif in stainless steel on the spine. It comes with a soft leather belt sheath also stamped with the bee emblem.

Handmade:

Every knife is a work of art. Genuine Laguiole pocketknives and table knives are characterized by the artesian craft. Each knife is handmade from start to finish by one person. The beautiful, fine file work on the back of the blade is very characteristic. In addition, special and unique material is used for the handle. Think of buffalo horn, juniper wood and warthog tooth. But also the use of Damascus steel, silver and mammoth ivory is very common with the more exclusive Laguiole knives.

Laguiole a brand?

A lot of people think that Laguiole is a brand name. This is not the case: Laguiole is a generic name for the model that originates from the village of Laguiole. The name Laguiole is not protected. At least, not the knives. The Laguiole cheese is protected by an Appellation d'Origins Control (AOC). This means that only cheese produced in the village of Laguiole may carry the name Laguiole. Violation of this is punishable.

So in closing, we find that the only registered and legally protected term Laguiole is not for a knife, but for a French cheese.
