No matter what thoughts you have regarding the pandemic situation of March and April 2020, we, the Oregon Knife Collectors Association, were required to cancel our April Show. We may be down but hardly out.

A No Show

The cancelling of the OKCA Annual Knife Show has been tough to accept. However, the financial impact to our organization has been minimal. The Lane Events Center has assured us the payments already made will be applied to the 2021 Show.

All advertisements for the Show have been cancelled. The Fire Marshall has returned our permit/inspection check. There were expenses which could not be cancelled, and those have been paid and will not be too much of a hardship.

Having another Show in 2020 like the April Show is not a reality. Part of our success has been the timing of our event. The dates have been reserved for five (5) years into the future. Another consideration is the location or building space.


Getting the Word out....

We made massive efforts to alert our members of the "No Show." The website had a large notice of cancellation. Our Facebook page was updated to inform everyone about the cancellation. The general spirit of acceptance was outstanding. All the emails (lots and lots) were promptly answered, and all the telephone calls were handled quickly and courteously. We also mailed out 800 plus postcards to our 2019 and 2020 member to the addresses we had on file.

The cancellation of the Show was decided by the edict of the Oregon State Governor. Until that moment in time, the Show was scheduled to happen. However, the directive by the Governor could not be ignored.

The 2020 Club Knife

The edict for company closures has affected the Club knife delivery. Delivery on schedule is not possible. Great Eastern has complied with the State and Federal directives and is closed.
Therefore we are expecting a delay.
But a delay only.
Nothing more. We will advise when we have delivery of the knives and when they will be shipped. Many of the members intended to pick up the Great Eastern Club knife at the



Show, however it will be necessary to mail them when they arrive. That will be the most expedient way. For those who did not specify a mail out, we will go forward in the mailing. Our standard charge for mailing has been \$20.00. No one is obligated to forward that payment, however any help from you to offset this extra cost will not be refused.

And about the 2021 Show tables.....

The Board has decided to rollover the 2020 table payments made to the OKCA for tables at the 2021 Show. However, we do require you to fill out an application form for the 2021 Show. On that contractual form, you must advise it is from a "roll over" payment. It might be a good idea to also include your dues for membership for 2021. Not a requirement since you have until December 31, 2020. But it is a good idea. We have included an application form in this *Knewslettter* and have also made this form available on our website.

The 2021 Show theme



We do not know when we will have receipt of the knives but will

advise on our Facebook page and website when they are shipped.

We thank all of the members who have contributed to our *Knewslettter*. This publication helps to bind our group together. We have had to make major changes to our April and March *Knewslettter*. If you have any articles to share with us, they would be very much appreciated.

Unusual Remington Advertising Knife

I do not know about the rest of you knife collectors, but I have gotten to the point in my collecting that I really have to think long and hard about the purchase of a knife for my collection. I attribute this to a couple of things. First, I have more knives than I probably should have. I have collected Remington for about 25 years now and started with fixed blades, then Boy and Girl Scout, then bullets and bone handled folders and finally, pearl handled folders. Along the way I also got a wall full of Remington advertising which I really like. So in addition to having too many knives at my age, I begin to wonder about where this all ends and what will become of all this Remington stuff. Finally, I have found that there are only a few Remington items for which I am still really looking to find. These include a couple rare Remington scouts and utility knives and about 30 Remington pearl folders and one bullet.

So when this little R6473, two blade pen knife with a spear and file, only 3" long but with bone handles and a crest shield, came to my attention, I had to really think it over and also do some investigation. What I liked about it was: First: its condition, almost mint, never used, sharpened or cleaned up. Second: the pattern number is a very uncommon one due to the added expense of the crest shield. Third: it is an advertising knife





with the blade etched "SIMONDS Saws - Files" on the master blade rather than a Remington trademark etch. The final decision was, however, based on looking the name up on Google and finding out the company is well over 100 years old and still in business and has quite an interesting history.

SIMONDS Saws - Files was started in Fitchburg, Massachusetts, in 1832 by Able Simonds, making scythes and

woodworking knives. He was 20 years old, and the company was originally named J. T. Farwell, after his brother-in-law who was a partner. They changed the name to A. Simonds and Company in 1851, after Simonds bought out Farwell and started making saws, the Simonds handsaw, which is now quite a collector's item. The name was then changed

to Simonds Mfg. Co. It had one of the first all electrical manufacturing plants in Mass. and, in 1906 purchased the Canada Saw Company and renamed it Simonds Canada Saw. The company continued to grow and built the first windowless factory and changed its name to Simonds Saw and Steel. During the WWII years, fourth generation Don Simonds took over; and the company expanded making armor plates, cross-cut saws and other war materials.

In the 1950s and 60s, it was the second largest file producer in the world; and the name was changed to Simonds Industries, Inc. Today it is Simonds International, a world wide company making files, saws, cutting tools and band saws. It has been in business for more than 180 years. It also has a fabrication plant in Portland, Oregon. It merged with Burton Saw Company of Eugene, Oregon, in early 2018.

THIS IS A KNIFE SHOW. All tables must be 90% knives or knife related items (e.g. swords, axes, edged tools, edged weapons, knife books, knifemaking supplies). If in doubt, check with the Show Chairman ahead of time. The OKCA reserves the right to bar any item from display or sale. No firearms may be sold or shown at this Show

ALL EXHIBITORS are required to keep their tables set up throughout the public hours of the Show: 8 AM Saturday to 3 PM Sunday. ANY EXHIBITOR WHO LEAVES OR COV-**ERS THEIR TABLE BEFORE 3 PM SUNDAY FORFEITS** FUTURE RESERVATIONS AND WILL BE DENIED TABLES AT FUTURE OREGON KNIFE SHOWS.

DISPLAY TABLES will be around the perimeter of the room. Displays are eligible for display awards, which are hand-made knives donated by members and supporters of OKCA. Display judging will be by rules established by OKCA. Special category awards may also be offered. NOTHING MAY BE SOLD FROM DISPLAY TABLES.

SALE/TRADE TABLES Sharing of tables will not be allowed. Exhibitors must comply with all applicable local, state, and federal laws. Oregon has NO SALES TAX.

BADGES: Each table-holder is entitled to one additional Show badge. NO EXCEPTIONS.

KNIFEMAKERS who are present and are table-holders at this Show may enter knives in the knifemaking award competition.

FOR MORE INFORMATION on categories and judging criteria in the display and hand-made knife competitions, contact the Show Chairman.

SHOW FACILITATORS will be provided by OKCA from 10AM Friday until 4 PM Sunday. However, exhibitors are responsible for watching their own tables. Neither the OKCA nor the Lane Events Center will be responsible for any loss, theft, damage, or injury of any kind.

CITY AND COUNTY REGULATIONS require that there be:

- · No Smoking within the Exhibit Hall at any time;
- No alcoholic beverages consumed within the Exhibit Hall during the public hours of the Show;
- No loaded firearms worn or displayed at the Show;
- No swords or knives brandished or displayed in a provocative manner.

NOTE ON SWITCHBLADES AND DAGGERS: In Oregon it is legal to make, sell, buy, or own switchblade knives. However, it is ILLEGAL to carry a switchblade knife, a gravity knife, a dagger, or a dirk concealed on one's person, or for a convicted felon to possess a switchblade or gravity knife. Most other states have banned switchblade knives. Under federal law, it is ILLEGAL to mail, carry, or ship a switchblade or gravity knife across state lines.

At Long Last!

I was pretty sure it would never happen; but at long last, after 20 years of "Lusting After" them, I have finally managed to acquire a small part of the collection that seemed to me to be the "end all" in my quest for the best of the best in "Fine" pocketknives.



I first learned of the knives in 1999 when I got my copy of the book *Sheffield Exhibition Knives* from my friend Bill Clausen. On pages 171 through 185 contributing writer J. Bruce Voyles tells the fascinating story of the John Blyde/John Greenhough exhibition knives.



Greenhough was originally just across the street behind George Wostenholm's Washington Works. They were tenants of Wostenholm for something around 100 years. They were a very small company, probably around 25 or so, and were absorbed by John Blyde pretty early on. They must have kept some autonomy though; as all the knives in the display are stamped "J. Greenhough," some with the "Gofer" stamp that was a

trademark shared by both Blyde and Greenhough. Judging by the workmanship, close tolerances and file work, I would not be a bit surprised if Greenhough cutlers built some of the "exhibition" grade fine pocketknives shown by Wostenholm and,

possibly, even Rodgers in the late 1800s. There is certainly a great deal in common in regards to outstanding workmanship in these "Fine" pocketknives from that time period. (This is me "supposing" and NOT gospel!)

The knives were made prior to 1879 and were awarded first place at the Sheffield Cutlery Fair in 1879 and an award in Sydney, Australia, the same year. The Greenhough knives also won first place at the Crystal Palace Exhibition in 1894. During the "Golden Age" of Sheffield, when their knives were judged the best in the world, these were judged the best of the best!


Thankfully, the collection on the original display board was purchased intact in 1970 and was photographed intact before the knives were removed from the display board in the 1980s. Unfortunately the center piece "Carnovan" knife disappeared when the collection was broken up. If anyone finds that one, he has something truly amazing!

All of the knives are just outstanding workmanship. All with that famous "black polish," incredibly tight construction and great natural handle materials. There are a couple two blade pen knives, several whittlers, a six blade wonder only about 1-1/2" long and three Wharncliffe pieces that are just fantastic. The four blade Wharncliffe piece with tortoise shell is one of the neatest pocketknives I can ever remember seeing, unabashedly my favorite! Eight of the eleven came directly from Voyles, and the other three from Claussen, Thank You!, both.



My plan was to show these in April along with my "Sunday Knives" exhibit, however a tragedy interfered with that.

Herein are some pictures of the Greenhough knives. All are just gorgeous, some a bit more than others, what with filework on the blade backs and inside the back springs. Some have gold wash on the bolsters and back springs. All built to exceptionally close standards, the four blade Wharncliffe is just 1/4"-size thick!! Have you ever seen knives where the through the tang nail marks curve with the shape of the blades? The whittlers and two blade pieces are about what one would expect of finely built pocketknives, the other five knives have all the bells and whistles and are just exquisite pieces.



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The Colonial Survival Knife

In 1944 during WWII, the call went out for a survival knife for the Army Air Corps and also the Navy. Sheath knives were bulky, big and long; so a folding compact survival knife was required.. Colonial Knife Company produced what is sometimes referred to as a folding pilots' knife. The knife that was selected was called the Jiant Jack Knife or Jumbo Jack Knife. The size and weight of this knife could serve as a knife that would fit into a vest type emergency kit, be used as a machete, could cut through wood, plexiglass and metal and be used for personal defense. This was then classified as a survival knife.


This Jiant (Giant) weighed 14 ounces, 6" closed, 7/8" wide and measured 15-3/4" with both blades open. There was also a liner lock for the main cutting blade. The blades were black parkerized (black oxide); and the handle was made of black Tenite, a durable form of plastic. These were made by the Colonial Knife Company of Rhode Island and United Machine Tool of Michigan. The Army knife did not have a bail (lanyard or sometimes referred to as a staple), whereas the Navy issue had a bail. The Navy knife also came in a canvas web sheath that fit on a belt.

A sheath knife was difficult to carry in an airplane and often got caught up on things. Prior to the Jiant knife, each of the services left the knife of choice to the individual. There was the need to be consistent, which is the military way. This made the folding Jiant knife a perfect solution.

I think they made a hundert bazillion of these knives for the military up through the 1960s. They were also sold in the commercial market place at the astonishing price of \$2.95. In the commercial market a pocketknife of this size was not especially popular. Bear in mind that all these knives came

with a main blade and a high speed steel saw. It is common to see these knives with the saw blade broken. This spurred the removal of the blade, and the knife was reassembled with just one blade. Sometimes the saw was replaced by another handmade blade. Often the blades and bolsters will show a high polish, but again not the military way. The military required that the finish be dull black to avoid sun or moon reflections. And then there is the seller who has one who will swear on a stack of bibles that this was the way they were created for the military in the war years. Not so.

I believe the saw blade was made incorrectly. Yes, it would cut metals and wood; but the cutting stroke was on the push. If the saw blade bound up, it would snap. Western/Coleman made a reproduction of the Jiant Jumbo knife in the 1980s but corrected the saw blade to cut on the back stroke. These knives are not often seen as, again, it is a big knife and the market is really small. Basically, as the Aussie said, "That is not a knife. This is a knife."

High Points In My Knife Life

There have been many high points in my years of working with knives and knife people. If you like knives, most of your experiences concerning them are enjoyable, but some are more memorable than others; and I will relate a few of mine here. Since I have been writing about knives for twenty years, both for the *Knewslettter* and some magazines, I will refer you to several of my articles, if you want more detail on any given instance.



The first high light, naturally, concerns the first knife I had completed from a blade and handle materials bought at a gun show. The seller was having some wrist problems and was selling all his stuff. With his instructions, I was sure I could put the handle pieces together on the blade. In just a few days I had completed a knife that looked good and felt good in the hand, too.

I showed it to a friend, and he thought it was beautiful. He liked it so well that I made one for him along with a leather sheath I had learned how to make in a book. Then my brother wanted one and then another one to give to his stepson. Next another friend wanted one, and I began to think it was pretty nice to hear people say how nice my work looked and enjoy working on them, too.

Of course, I soon was ordering knife blades and handle materials by mail and also buying knife books, as well. I also talked to makers at shows, where I bought more blades and handle materials.

Another high point occurred at a Show close to twenty years ago. I had already written some articles for the Club by then.

I went to the awards session at the close of the day and towards the end I was surprised to hear my name called. I went forward and was handed a small folder. When I opened it, there was a silver medallion with a beaver on one side and a lighthouse on the other.

Beautiful! I've received one every year since.

Of course, every Show is a high point. I enjoy the displays, the friends, meeting new people and looking for treasures. I always go home happy. (See "Another Show..." April 2011 p. 4)

A younger (teenage) hunter in our group was the catalyst for the next high point I describe. We all had nick names we called each other. This kid's dad was Long Knife, so we called the youngster Pen Knife. After a couple years he said he wanted to be called Hunting Knife. He was approaching six feet so it looked reasonable, but we decided he should earn it by getting a bull elk all by himself. A year or so later, he and another lad in our group went out from our camp over a ridge and downed an elk between the two of them. But...neither one of them had a knife with him. So Pen Knife got a new name, but not Hunting Knife. We called him No Knife for quite some time. He did however later get a bull elk all by himself, and we were proud to call him Hunting Knife. As a result of all this, I asked him if he would like to have a handmade hunting knife. He indicated he could not afford a knife like that. When I convinced him it would be a gift, I went to work on it. About a year later it was finished, and I delivered it to him. I don't know who enjoyed that meeting more...him enjoying the knife or me enjoying him being pleased. That's another of my gift knives that never went to the woods, instead sat on a shelf for display.

Seeing my first article published in the *Knewslettter* was a high point, as were the knife articles in *Blade Magazine, Knife*



World, and Dakota Outdoors. Every time I bought a knife at a show was a high point.

Early on in my membership in this association, I went to an after-show potluck dinner that used to occur at the close of the Winter Show. There was a chance to visit with other knife people that we weren't able to contact during the Show. At time to eat one member asked a blessing for our food. It was good food. The President of the association stood up at the end and advised us to be nice to each other and be careful going home. I like knife people.



The best one I have saved for last. At a wedding breakfast years ago, a relative asked me to make a knife for her son who had just retired from military Special Forces. I agreed to do it, but it took two years at my hobby pace. Every few months I sent him pictures by email to show my progress. When I finally sent it to him, I got an email back expressing his appreciation and a picture of the knife lying on a deer he and his son had taken.
